

NAMA CONVENTION 2014 - YNDYSSAGH! WE WENT BACK.

A QUICK RECOUNTING OF OUR WONDERFUL CONVENTION ON THE ISLE OF MAN

Dear Members, I want to share some highlights from the 2014 Convention on the Isle of Man with you. If you couldn't come, we missed you! If you came and liked it -start preparing for Annapolis, MD in 2016. Kelly.



Day One - July 3rd 2014 We checked in our 64 delegates and doled out tickets for various events, both to our party of official members, and the other large group of Peterson family members who came along with Lucy. Altogether we had around 90 American Manx, two Canadians and one Australian on this trip! Our convention bags were donated by Island of Culture and contained Manx gifts and leaflets from a variety of generous local sources, including the Manx Fudge Company, Culture Vannin, the Manx Shipping Register and

the Isle of Man Post Office. The Convention Souvenir was a Laxey Woollen Mills blue Manx tartan scarf embroidered with the three legs. (Some are still available at \$20 inc. postage. Contact Kelly McCarthy. First come; first served.)



Check-in was conducted by local volunteers Anne Minay and Voirrey Horne, and gave members their first sight of the beautiful Manx Roof Pattern quilt generously donated by Mannin Quilters. Later that day, through the kindness of Madame President Clare Christian, we were en on a tour of the three houses of Tynwald. showed us her official robes explained the sym-

bolism embroidered upon them. The NAMA Board was afforded the very great honor of holding our Board meeting in the Legislative Council Chamber. The minutes from this meeting reflect the fact that we did indeed "go back."

In the evening, Manx National Heritage hosted us at the Museum where we could tour the fabulous exhibits, including their collection of World War I artifacts. They even brought out Kearsley Walsh's great-uncle's uniform from the Boer War. Among the guests welcoming us were His Worship and Mrs. Stan Cain, the current Mayor and Mayoress of Douglas, Mr. Alex Downie, OBE, MLC and Mr. Edmund

Southworth of Manx National Heritage. Many of the MNH trustees had come to welcome us and mix with this large group of American visitors. We were entertained with wine and Manx cheeses under the bleached bones of the great whale in the Manx wildlife room.

Day Two - Friday July 4th began with the laying of a wreath at the Manx Aviation and Military Museum, Ronaldsway Airport in Ballasalla. Our friend, Ivor Ramsden had worked hard



to create a beautiful Canadian Memorial Garden to commemorate the lives of 28 Canadian airmen who died in flying accidents in the Isle of Man between 1941 and 1944.

Then we drove, in the pouring rain, to Cregneash. (It was the only bad weather day of the trip.) We were fortunate to have Andrew Foxton onboard our buses (he swapped between

them) who is an experienced tour guide. He described where we were driving and how important the living folk museum is to the history of the island. (You may have seen it featured in the movie, Waking Ned Devine.) We also stopped

at the Sound for a breathtaking -- and windy -- photo op. Thanks to Manx National Heritage -- especially Edmund Southworth and the Trustees -- for all their support and assistance in putting together this trip.

Lunch was a catered affair at the Castletown Civic Centre. We were met by Chairman of the Commissioners, Richard McAleer and other local dignitaries. The hall had been beautifully decorated for us by local Manx friend, Dawn Scott. Castletown Commissioners very gracefully presented us with gifts bearing their symbol and we responded with a gift from Mount Vernon, home of George Washington.



After lunch we visited sites in Castletown including The Nautical Museum, which houses "The Peggy," a perfectly preserved old schooner from the "running trade" (smuggling) which had been boarded up and left undisturbed for many years. We also visited the Old House of Keys, and many went to clamber around Castle Rushen. From there, we went to Peel and received a generous Afternoon Tea from the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Isle of Man.

That evening we celebrated the 4th of July with an American themed buffet and the fabulous Castle Rushen High School Swing Band. We also took our Convention photo. It's reproduced on the back of this Bulletin.

Day Three - Saturday July 5th A peaceful day. We began with a Manx quilting masterclass with Chris Eastham of Mannin Quilters. Then we were left to our own devices during the day. Later, there was a talk on Y-DNA and Manx heritage given by John Creer. In the evening we held our Convention Dinner at the Sefton hotel. Again, beautiful and elaborate table decorations featuring Manx flowers and fabrics graced our tables courtesy of the very talented Dawn Scott.

Honored Guests at our Convention Dinner included: Alex Downie, OBE, MLC, Guest Speaker; Hon. Tim Crookall, MHK, Minister for Education and Children presenting NAMA Youth Award; Mandy Griffin, 2014 Cleveland Medal Winner; Edmund Southworth, Director, Manx National Heritage; Adrian Cain, Culture Vannin; Peter Kelly, President World Manx Association and Honorary Vice-President of NAMA; MeShell Berry, Department of Education and Children. The invocation was given by NAMA Chaplain: Rev. Canon Stephen Schaitberger

During the dinner a special award carved from Manx Mountain Ash was presented to Florence Abbinanti who was celebrating her 22nd NAMA Convention at the tender age of 93. A gift was also given to former Chief Minister Donald Gelling who was born on Tynwald Day, July 5th. David Nixon accepted the NAMA Youth Award from Minister Tim Crookhall on behalf of Sometimes Y, the Massachusettsbased dance group that entertained crowds at Tynwald Fair in 2013. Anne Minay, the Island organizer of the Convention was presented with an American flag throw and to her great surprise, Honorary Life Membership of NAMA for all her hard work and support. The NAMA Scholarships were awarded to American members under-30 who had traveled to the island for the Convention.

Mandy Griffin movingly explained that the Cleveland Medal was the event that had inspired her to become a singer when she was just ten years old. She went on to perform the songs that had just secured her fourth victory in the highly competitive Cleveland Medal competition at the Manx Music Festival, or Guild, as it is known on the island. It was an honor and delight to hear her and we hope she will visit us in America.

Alex Downie OBE, MLC, our Guest Speaker and great friend of NAMA, gave a very interesting speech about the Manx who had left for America and the fact that not all of them were model citizens (one was hanged for bigamy!) before going on to describe Manx successes of the past few years in economic, social and sporting fields.

During the dinner, Jack Cormode, as the senior Past President present, officiated as 1st Vice-President Kelly McCarthy became President and the 2014 slate of members was approved by the General Membership. We welcomed new Trustee, Bill Cassidy from Virginia and our new 3rd Vice-President, David Nixon from Massachusetts. Adrian Cain, the Manx Language Officer, ended our evening by drawing the raffle in Manx and teaching us a few phrases including the expression "Ta mee toiggal beggyn Gaelg" (I understand a little Manx!) We closed the evening with a rendition of "Ellan Vannin" bolstered by local singers in our midst including Noel and Mary Cringle, Dollin Kelly RBV and his wife Jean, Donald and Joan Gelling and Mandy Griffin.

Day 4 - Sunday July 6th We started our proceedings in the atrium of the Villa Maria Arcade with the National anthems sung by the sparse collection of members accompanied on the Mighty Wurlitzer. It was magnificent! Following our Board meeting we were treated to a backstage tour of the Gaiety Theatre and all its secrets including the world's only Corsican trap.

Then it was off to get changed for the Tynwald Garden Party at the Nunnery. Hats and frocks were in abundance. Margie Martinsen had hand-assembled her entire costume. We were guests of Tynwald and treated to a beautiful day as well as tea and cakes on the lawn. All very Downton Abbey!

Day Five - Monday, July 7th - Tynwald Day Celebrations. Our last day of the Convention was very special. The President of Tynwald, our dear friend, Clare Christian, had organized grandstand seats for us to watch the ancient ceremony of the promulgation of the 2014 laws. Presidents Jody Morey and Kelly McCarthy were given guest tickets to the St. John's Chapel for the service and signing into law of the Acts. Everyone enjoyed the delights of a perfect Fair Day and

all the entertainments that go with it. Manx Dancing, Manx food, handcrafts, artworks and locally produced goods of every kind were available. Members were also welcomed to the World Manx Association's tent - a haven for the weary.

Because of Tynwald's own Banquet dinner, the Sefton Hotel kitchen and serving staff was called away to work at the nearby Villa Marina. So we asked the local Italian restaurant. The Italian Job, whether it would open up especially for us. What a great buffet meal! It was

PRESENTATION OF THE 2014 NAMA YOUTH AWARDS

On Friday, July 4, 2014 Manx students were awarded silver medallions for making significant contributions to Manx culture and life. Individuals under the age of 18 were awarded this year for outstanding achievement in Manx Music, Arts and Crafts, Manx Language, Manx Culture and outstanding contribution to the Manx Community. There were also awards for a student over the age of 18 for Outstanding Contribution to Manx Culture and for Outstanding contributions by a group under the age of 25.

Each year the Department of Education and Children invites nominations for the yearly awards. Winners are then chosen from those nominated. The silver medallions, minted by the Pobjoy Mint, are highly regarded by the recipients. NAMA hopes that by sponsoring these awards, students will encourage others to excel in the knowledge and sharing of Manx traditions. The awards took place at the Barrule Suite in the Tynwald, or parliament building.

This year, some of the students shared their talents by playing music, showing a art project and sharing their knowledge of the Manx language. The photo shows the awardees. Marshall Hopewell Cannell Jr. passed away unexpectedly on March 11, 2014, at the age of 83, just before we sent the last Bulletin to press. He was our Honorary President and will be greatly missed. He was born in Providence, Rhode Island, son of Marshall H. Cannell, Sr., and Sarah Catherine McKenzie Cannell. He graduated from the

Moses Brown School and Brown University in Providence.

In 1956, he began his career by becoming one of the first computer programmers in the country. He had a long career with Systems Development Corporation (SDC) as a systems consultant to the US Air Force. He retired in 1991. He then served 15 years teaching Technical Theatre and the Origins of Western Drama at Wellesley Middle School. One of his most cherished positions was as President of the North American Manx Association (NAMA).

Marshall is survived by his wife of 62 years, Valentina Cannell (nee Baudel de Vaudrecourt); his daughters Bonny Cannell Nothern and Alejandra Cannell Huete, four grand children, a brother, Christian Cannell and a sister, Mary Cannell Andrews of Virginia.



CHILDREN'S CORNER JODY'S SCAANJOON KEYLLEY!



Look who we found on the Isle of Man! Lemurs are part of a very interesting and varied species of primate. They are only found on the islands of Madagascar and Comoros. There are almost 100 different

kinds and they vary greatly in size (from under two ounces to 20 lbs.) and looks (they can look like a monkey, a mouse or a squirrel). They can differ in color, food preferences and the way they move about. Most are more active at night although some prefer moving about in the daylight. They are quite social and live in family groups, in trees or on the ground. Because there are so many different kinds they are fun to learn about. Jody met this fine lemur at The Wildlife Park on the Isle of Man. The Manx word for lemur is scaanjoon keylley. "Skan-JOON kehllya"

THE CLEVELAND MEDAL



The Cleveland Medal is the highest award in Manx singing - a gold disc that is traditionally given every year by the Manx Society of Cleveland, OH at the end of the Manx Music Festival or "The Guild" as locals refer to it. The six finalists are the winners of their Special class for bass, baritone, tenor, contralto, mezzo-soprano and soprano. To enter the Special class they must previously have won an Open class. This year's winner, contralto Mandy Griffin is a four times Cleveland winner. She very kindly sang for us at our Convention Dinner.
