

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Bannaghtyn! Greetings! On March 20th I had the pleasure of attending the William Kennish memorial service in Brooklyn, New York. The occasion was to set a proper monument of engraved Manx granite on the previous unmarked grave in Green Wood

Cemetery. Rather than being a somber affair, this was truly a celebration of the life of a prolific Manx inventor of the Victorian era, on the 155th anniversary of his passing. To know more about him Google his name, there is a wealth of information in the internet about this man who would have been as famous as Mark Cavendish in his day.

Four generations of Kennish descendants were present, representing Manx and American sides of the family. The Isle of Man government was represented by Hon. Stephen Rodan, President of Tynwald. Commander Richard McHugh, an assistant Naval Attaché from the British Embassy represented the British Navy, which benefitted greatly from Kennish's methods of directing naval cannon fire. The Manx media was there as well, with manx.net TV producer, Paul Moulton.

Highlights of the proceeding and interviews with several participants are available on manx.net TV. The IOM does not have its own TV station but is not its broadcast TV from the BBC. However, Manx Telecom provides the next best thing, with on-demand TV news and events. The easiest way to get to the segments related to this event is to open manx.net in a web browser, click on "mt tv" in the green bar at the top, then enter "Kennish" in the MT TV search bar at the top. That will display all of the content related to this event (8 clips so far), as well as lots about other Kennishs as well!

Most NAMA members know the nuggets of information that we share about our Manx heritage when the topic comes up: world's oldest continuous parliament, TT races, Waking Ned, etc. <u>Message from the Editor</u> Please accept my apologies for the lateness of this Bulletin. Probably the most fun I had was at dinner the evening before, with the group that included several of William Kennish's American descendants. The conversation covered a broad range of topics, and I was able to fill them in on the Manx connections that they hadn't been aware of – especially telling a Bee Gees fan where the band was originally from.

The day of the ceremony was crisp and sunny. It was difficult to tear myself away from engineering shop talk at breakfast with organizer Bob Stimpson (who has over 500 patents). The proceedings began with a well-attended service in a historic chapel filled with stained glass at the cemetery. Fr Rundlett provided a welcome and Introduction. Robert Stimpson discussed the resume of William Kennish. Hon Stephen Rodan and Commander Richard McHugh provided an address.

We then retired to the graveside. Stephen Rodan began an eloquent eulogy. It must have been exactly noon at the time, because the deep "bong" of church bells could be heard as he spoke. You can watch the address yourself on manx.net. The marker was unveiled by Bob Stimpson, whose determination in seeing a proper recognition for this *Manninagh Dooie* (True Manxman) was finally realized.

SMALL WORLD

The William Kennish memorial in Brooklyn NY included a brief chapel service at the cemetery. Most of the people arriving at the chapel were those with the group that we were expecting, but there were a few new faces.

There were also several who just poked their head in the door to see the ornate interior of the chapel. One was Miriam Kelly, who is an architect specializing in building conservation. We greeted her at the door and inquired if she was here for the William Kennish memorial. She responded no, she was asking about the Manx flag draped over the railing in front, and then she recognized Steve Rodan (President of Tynwald).



It turns out she is a Manxie from Port St Mary. She just happened to pop in at the right time - there was no indication of any Manx activity from the outside.

THE FIRST GREAT MANX HOMECOMING BY MYRRA (STEVENSON) JOHNSON

It's hard to imagine when there were no homecomings to the green hills by the sea and the rocky shores of the little Isle of Man - it's been such a long time ago. But in 1926 a group was formed that decided it would be nice to make a trip to their homeland once again. It was the first time a trip as a group had been contemplated. Its success led to the creation of the North American Manx Association. My father, Walter Stevenson, was instrumental in getting this group together and was their guide on the trip back to the little island. I came across some interesting information about this journey in looking through some files of his.

The Homecomers sailed on the chartered White Star liner "Albertic" leaving Montreal on June 3rd, 1927 about 4:00-5:00 a.m. They had had a banquet on board the ship the night before. The "Albertic" arrived in Quebec about noon, and

the Homecomers had about 5 hours for sightseeing in that city. There were about 300 Manx people from the United States and Canada that made the trip to their homeland at this time. I looked at this number several times to make sure it was correct, as it was so large. However, I remembered that there were many people from the Isle of Man that had emigrated to the United States around the early 1900's (including my Dad and several other members of his family) - with large groups settling in Cleveland, Chicago and many parts of Wisconsin, some going as far as Vancouver, Canada. (I had some relatives who traveled to the latter).

After an eight-day ocean journey, they arrived in the Isle of Man on Saturday, June 11th at 8:00 a.m. in the morning. According to my Dad's notes, it was a beautiful day. There were about 50 to 70 people that were at the pier in Douglas to greet them, including the mayor of Douglas and other notables, as well as bands. It was a very exciting time for everyone. There was the Mayor's official reception for all the Homecomers early on. Another reception was held by the Douglas Council at the Villa Marina. For nearly two weeks there were "festive preparations" made for them everywhere, according to my father's hand written notes. The famous TT races were also held during the time that the Homecomers were there. The account says that they were treated royally during the entire time they were on the island.

A very interesting incident occurred during this first Homecoming visit, at least as far as my family was concerned. My father was a distinguished and experienced bass-baritone singer. He was known as "the Manx Basso". During the trip he was asked to sing as entertainment on one of the programs that was held during the ocean voyage. As well, in planning the festive dinner that was arranged for them at the Villa Marina in Douglas, my father was asked to sing. However, he said that he would need an accompanist to work with him. He was told that they would get one of the finest accompanists on the island who had just come back to the island after graduating from the Royal Academy of Music in London, a very reputable school. To make a long story short, a romance followed. My father became engaged to this accompanist, whose name was Doris Sale - but he had to follow through on his duties to bring

the Homecomers back to the United States. It took him approximately a year to earn enough money to buy another round-trip ticket to the Island, as well as a one way ticket to bring my future mother back to the United States as his wife. They were married in Castletown on April 30, 1928. They did professional work in music shortly after they arrived in Chicago, and were known as the Stevenson Duo. A musical career together ensued. This was all due to the first Manx Homecoming in 1927!

It is unlikely that anybody is still living that went on that first great Homecoming trip. However perhaps their descendants or relatives might be able to tell some interesting anecdotal stories that had been passed down. It would be interesting to hear their reports on it. I don't happen to have the list of people that made that trip so long ago. I believe there were newspaper articles about it in some of my father's material that was donated to the Manx Museum at the University of Wisconsin in Platteville, Wisconsin, if anyone desired to look into it further.



CLARION CALL TO ALL LOYAL MANX WHERE EVER YOU ARE!

We are writing to you as we hope that though you may live far away, you may keep strong links with your Manx roots, and will be happy to hear that one of the iconic landmarks of the Island has a real chance at last of being restored.

Ramsey Pier was built in 1886, designed by the foremost naval architect of the Victorian era – Sir John Coode, as one of his last works. It is the 6th longest pier in Great Britain at 684 meters long. Sir John also built and advised on harbors in Australia, New Zealand South Africa and all over the UK.

For 100 years the pier functioned as a dock for smaller shipping, a landing point, and an unparalleled recreational asset where people came from all over the island and beyond to ride on the little train, fish from its bays, and enjoy the superb view of the northern plain which borders the sea front of Ramsey and Maughold Head.



Over the last 20-30 years the Pier has sat forlornly empty and abandoned. Various attempts were made to work out what to do, both by individuals and the Government, but until last year, nothing happened. Now however, a group of retired engineers, naval officers and general Pier enthusiasts have by pure will power managed to convince the Government that something can be done. In the last year they have set up a Charitable Trust (The Queen's Pier Restoration Trust) with all its relevant officers, bank accounts etc. They were then authorized to undertake a full structural survey of the pier. By October every bay, strut and plank had been examined, filmed and structurally assessed. Amazingly the cast iron legs are still in good condition, and though many of the girders will need to be replaced, it is a relatively easy task. Even much of the 150-year-old teak planking is still in excellent condition! The railings, and some of the smaller artifacts are still safely in storage in Jurby.

Please be part of this great public effort and register your willingness to help us – in however small a way. Of course if you – or your children, could come over and spend a few months working with our volunteers in the workshops, in the replacing of defective elements or in cleaning down and repainting the good parts, you would be hugely welcome! IN MEMORIAM

UK producer-financier **Steve Christian** died unexpectedly at home aged 53 on Fenruary 18, 2017. NAMA members may remember his illuminating talk at the 2006 Convention in Chicago.

He was intrinsic to the development of the Isle Of Man Film Commission, which invested in projects including *Lawless Heart, The Libertine* and *Revolver* as well as TV series *The Shadow Line*. He launched production and distribution outfit CinemaNX, which was backed by the Isle of Man government, in 2007 alongside producer Marc Samuelson. The outfit backed titles including *Me And Orson Welles, The Disappearance of Alice Creed* and *Chico & Rita*. Christian joined Pinewood Pictures in 2012 when the studio took over management of the Isle of Man's \$38.5m (£25m) Media Development Fund in return for the Isle of Man taking a 19% stake in Pinewood Group. Marilyn K. Underhill, departed February 16th 2016. Her three daughters are Lifetime members of the North American Manx Association and we extend our condolences to them and their families.

OBITUARIES MARILYN K. UNDERHILL 1930-2016

HILLSDALE - Marilyn K. Underhill, 85, of Hillsda passed away Saturday, February 13, 2016 at Drews Place of Village Green in Hillsdale. She was born June 12, 1930 in Kendallville, Indiana to Verne Clifford and Velma (Cain) Knight, Marilyn mar ried Robert Underhill in June of 1954 and after 23 years in Hillsdale and 25 years in Florida, she returned to Hillsdale in 2001.

Marilyn graduated from North Side High School in Fort Wayne in 1948 and from Kalamazoo College, where she was a member of Eurodelphian Gamma and the Kalamazoo College Choir. Marilyn had a love for volunteering and serving others through her work as a Girl Scout camp coun-selor and leader, Camp Fire leader and board member, and American Red Cross volunteer worker for victims of tornados. She also enjoyed volunteering with Special Skaters Society for mentally and physically challenged children and tutoring mathematic students in GED programs in Florida and Hillsdale. Mona Creer, neé Broadbent, (a longtime member of the Chicago Manx) passed away on December 6, 2016, aged 92. Mona's husband, Clarence, served on the NAMA Board for over 30 years, although never as President. Both Mona and Clarence were proud of their Manx roots, with Mona being a Joughin on her mother's side.

Mona's contribution to the Association was very largely through what was then the Ladies' Auxiliary. Some of our Convention traditions continue from these days. The Ladies' Auxiliary was the group that handled the sales tables at the conventions, the raffles, the program and its advertisements, and they also hosted a luncheon at each convention. Their funds were separate from the NAMA funds and were originally used to support Manx immigrants, principally by helping them to find work in the USA. If an immigrant could not find suitable work in a reasonable amount of time, the Ladies Auxiliary also stood by with financial aid directly. It was modeled after both Cleveland's and Chicago's Mona's Relief Societies. Of course, immigration from the IOM to the USA slowed considerably after WWI, and the Ladies' Auxiliary had less and less purpose, which led to its ultimate disbanding following the Madison Convention.

The William Kennish Memorial is carved from Manx stone from Dhoon Quarry, and was shipped from the Island to mark his grave in Green-Wood Cemetery, Brooklyn, New York. William Kennish died in New York on 19th March 1862 as a result of complications from illnesses he contracted whilst in the New Grenadian jungle. The stone was placed by his descendants, the school-children and the people of the Isle of Man, in the presence of the Hon Stephen Rodan, the President of Tynwald, the parliament of the Isle of Man - home of the world's oldest continuous parliament. The North American Manx Association made a donation to the fund and is represented here by President Jim Kneale (far left in this photo.)
