Recent conventions have hosted classes in Manx culture. This year, Bill Cassidy presented a wonderful session designed to let us learn some basic Manx phrases. This will be an ongoing mission of his and the first written class is included in this newsletter. Margie Martinson spoke about Manx fairy tales that meant something to her. The NAMA motto is "Whatever is left to us of our ancient heritage," and it is our ambition to foster more Manx culture, here in the USA through our meetings and publications.

In his talk, David Holmes, the now 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President, joked that he didn't think he was qualified as he is not 100% Manx. The irony is that I, your new president, am in fact 100% American. Both sets of my grandparents, my parents, my brother and I were all born in The United States of America. However, as an American, I concede that we all love to claim our desirable heritage, as such I am 25% Manx!

#### The Future

During my speech thanking everyone for supporting my NAMA presidency, I addressed what is NAMA's future. I asked more questions than I had answers to, because in the end we need **you**. The first big question was, who do we consider "young people" and how can we be more involved in NAMA and preserving our heritage. I am 35-years old and currently the youngest NAMA president in NAMA history. At present it looks that it will stay that way for the foreseeable future. # NAMA WORKSHOPS BRING MANX CULTURE TO THE CONVENTION

"Moghrey mie! Kys t'ou?" If you attended the Manx language workshop at the recent NAMA Convention (photo), you'd have a quick answer to that question (which translates as "Good morning! How are you?"). Perhaps "Feer vie!" ("very good") or maybe "goll as gaccan" (that's "going and grumbling").



Our convention in Victoria, British Columbia, this June was the second at which educational workshops were offered to bring a bit of Manx culture to North America and help us learn more about the heritage we gather every two years to celebrate. This year we focused on Manx folklore and language.

Margie Martinson-Brezina led the folklore workshop with an in-depth discussion of supernatural creatures from Manx folklore and legend, from the Ben Varrey (sea-woman or mermaid) to the Buggane. The Isle of Man shares some of these creates with other countries, but many are unique to Ellan Vannin.

Bill Cassidy presented a workshop on Gaelg, the Manx language, a Celtic language closely related to Irish and Scottish Gaelic. He led us through a beginner's lesson with simple conversations, and he ended with a list of handy expressions and exclamations — some of which aren't often taught!

"NAMA does a phenomenal job promoting and supporting Manx culture on the Isle of Man, but it's important to ensure that it's relevant to members in North America as well," said Cassidy, a trustee on NAMA's board. "It was really encouraging to hear from Manx students who benefited from NAMA awards."

Cassidy and others are already planning a series of workshops for the 2020 NAMA Convention in Plymouth, Massachusetts. Also look for Beggan Gaelg or "A Little Manx," a new column that will run in this newsletter. If you're interested in particular areas of Manx history and culture, let us know!

# MANXSPCA APPEAL

The ManxSPCA is the Island's only all animal rescue center, helping domestic, wild and feral animals. We require in the region of £860,000 per year to operate, and fundraising is a vital part of this. Our target this year is to raise £150,000 through fundraising and we are fortunate that Canadian businessman Mark Scheinberg, who lives on the Isle of Man, has agreed to match the total amount we raise from fundraising throughout 2018! If we reach our target for this year this will account for over a third of our annual expenditure.



Our fundraising total to the end of June 2018 was £55,000. This money has been raised in a number of different ways throughout the year including 'Dress up as an Animal Day' in the Islands primary schools (photo). Without the generosity of the Manx public and people living further afield we would not be able to survive in the new economic climate where elderly people must pay for care. # **BEGGAN GAELG: GREETINGS**

Bannaghtyn as failt erriu dys Beggan Gaelg! That's greetings, literally blessings or "bannaghtyn," and "a welcome on you" to Beggan Gaelg, a little Manx Gaelic. In this column, we'll share simple phrases and expressions in Manx that will help you better appreciate our ancestral tongue, understand it's importance in our heritage, and speak it.

Don't worry about pronunciation — you can hear all these words online at LearnManx.com.

We'll start with some basic greetings. First: **Moghrey mie!** Many of you will know this is the Manx for "good morning" -- though in Manx, the adjective follows the noun, so it's "morning good."

If we're past morning, we could say **Fastyr mie!** Which means "good afternoon." We could also say **Laa mie**, in which laa means day.

So, moghrey mie, fastyr mie, and laa mie. All good ways to greet people.

But what about "good night?"

We'll that's usually a parting phrase, but let's take a look at it. Night is oie. We know that good is mie, but the phrase "good night" in Manx is Oie vie.

Why is that? It's because nouns in Manx are either masculine or feminine, and a feminine noun lenites or softens the first consonant in the following adjective. Laa or day is masculine, so Laa mie. Oie is feminine, so Oie vie.

Remember, ours is not to reason why, but to just say "mie" or "vie."

With that, I'll wish you laa mie or oie vie, until the next time.

#### MINNESOTA MANX SOCIETY

At our last meeting we celebrated Hop tu Naa. We started by filling plates and bowls with all of the fabulous variety of food. We had soup, veggies, fruit, chips, cheese, olives, pickles, taco and cream dips, apple cake, sweet breads, cookies and drinks. Next Heather and Norbert Johnson gave a slide show presentation of their trip to the Isle of Man in 2006. They had some really beautiful pictures from Peel, Douglas, Ramsey and more. We also saw pictures of fuchsia, palm trees, gorse (Heather recommends staying out of the gorse as it has lots of thorns), Manx cats, steam trains, Camera Obscura, runic stones, Manx Celtic cross, (Usually a cross in a circle) and green telephone boxes. They talked about the locksmith monument (Milner's Tower in Port Erin), the triskelion (it always turns clockwise), the crofter's village at Cregneish (crofters are people who farmed and fished), and noted that the best time to travel there is September to May.

We moved on to the handouts talking about Hop tu Naa and related subjects. We learned about what Hop tu Naa is and where it started, how to carve turnip lanterns, spooky words that can be translated in Manx Gaelic, Manx bats from the Manx Bat Group, spooky and haunted places on IOM from Lovely Greens, IOM Paranormal Database Records, UFOs seen on IOM, and creatures of folklore from IOM. Sally then started the drawing and had our hostess Pat draw the raffle tickets.

Norbert then let us know that he and Jim Anderson are working finding out about the Manx graveyard. They travelled to the graveyard and saw the stones still there and they spoke with a neighbor on the property next door Richard Lace briefly. They still do not have anything solid yet but are continuing to work and move forward on it. The meeting concluded with Sally Dalquish talking about still working on the Manx tartan and talking the Scottish council, the NAMA meeting next year and the Manx facebook page/website and future updates. A big thank you to Pat Boehne for letting us have this meeting at her gorgeous condo party room and the great Hop tu Naa decorations! # BRAD'S COOL AUCTION FIND

Brad Prendergast found this little piece of history on an online auction. The caption, which is a bit hard to see on the scan says:



"Now there, look sharp, young feller! Did you never see a Manx Man before?"

The explanation that came with this lot was that Alfred Ashley was an English School caricaturist working in the style of Cruikshank, John Leech and Hablot Knight Browne. He illustrated book and magazines as well as painting landscapes. He exhibited 7 works between 1850 and 1853. This amusing drawing comes from a small folio of his caricatures. Some are initialed "AA". They date from circa 1840-45.

# INTRODUCTION TO DAVID HOLMES NAMA'S NEW THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT

Thus, the precedent had been set and a trip to Vancouver Island for Katy's inauguration had been in the diary for a long time.

Last year we were honoured to represent NAMA in attending both the Tynwald garden party at Government House and ceremony itself at St Johns – including seats in the chapel and processing to the hill with other "worthies"!!



I guess everyone is aware that the premier singing award at the Music Festival [the "Guild" as everyone on the Island knows it] is the Cleveland Medal presented annually by the Cleveland Manx Society; perhaps less well known are the NAMA Education Awards (*mentioned in the Bulletin*) intended "to ensure that our traditions continue, evolve and embrace developments in art, craft, language, and music". These are also judged annually, and I was pleased make some of the presentations in 2017.

# **FAMILY HISTORY**

It's time to start expanding what you have on your ancestors. You've pulled everything together and organized it. You've checked good sources for your pedigree through your great-grandparents (and maybe farther). It's time to see if others out there are researching your family as well.

Here's an assignment: go to the website www.family-search.org. Sign up for a free account, go to "Family Tree" and start entering your family. Note that living people will only show up on your own account – no one else will be able to see those names and information. But those farther back or with death dates will be visible to others.

As you go back on your tree, you might just be surprised as you find the names already in the database. You might find ancestors farther back than you already know about. But there is a precaution. Anyone signed into this site can add things or make changes. There have also been some computer errors as things were merged. There are mistakes! But there is a lot of great input as well. So use any new information you find as a clue for further research. It might just be a goldmine, but check it out. There are also helps for research and they have a lot of Manx information.

There are other sites where you can upload your family tree as well (such as Ancestry, etc.). You can do those, too. But family search has a lot of fun things that we will mention in the future and I am sure you will want to be able to do some of those. So, get your tree on there!
