## Official Program For 1930 Convention

### Registration Convention Fee - \$6.00

We have received from the W. M. A. the following programme for our 1930 Convention on the Island. This has been somewhat revised from the programme drawn up by the N. A. M. A. owing to the difficulty regarding the catering for lunches in Port Erin, Peel and Ramsey.

All convention meetings will be held in the Villa Marina, Douglas, from 10:00 A. M. to 12:30 P. M. visiting Port Erin, Peel and Ramsey in the afternoons of the three first days of the Convention. Friday will be an all day meeting in Douglas and it is hoped there will be a tree-planting ceremony to commemorate the 1930 visit, after the reception by his Worship the Mayor, in the afternoon.

The final rally and old time Mhealliah held on the last evening of the Convention, will be the big event, an open night when it is hoped to have one of the largest gatherings ever assembled at Villa Marina.

The \$6.00 registration fee is to cover the expense of the Convention which will include the engagement of Villa Marina for all meetings, the cost of conveyance and teas at Port Erin, Peel and Ramsey, convention badges and every incidental cost for the Convention.

The N. A. M. A. issues at this time a very cordial invitation to all members of British and Overseas Manx Societies to attend their meetings.

**TUESDAY, JUNE 24th:** Convention opens in Concert Pavilion at 10 a. m. Addresses by Alderman Crookall, M.H.K., and Mr. R. Cain, M.H.K. Afternoon—Leave Douglas at 2:15 p. m. for Castle Rushen. Brief address of welcome by the chairman of the Castletown Commissioners (Mr. J. W. Corrin), and short address by Mr. J. D. Qualtrough, M.H.K. Then on to Port Erin for tea. Address of welcome by the chairman of the Port Erin Commissioners (Mr. H. J. Clague), and short addresses by members of the Keys for the Sheading. Return via Rushen Abbey.

**WEDNESDAY, JUNE 25th:** Convention resumed at Villa Marina at 10 a. m. Afternoon—Leave Douglas, 2:15, for Peel. Tea at Peel. Address of welcome by the chairman of Peel Town Commissioners (Mr. W. Jenkinson), and short address by Mr. C. R. Shimmin, M.H.K. Return via Glen Helen.

**THURSDAY, JUNE 26th:** Convention resumed at Villa Marina, 10 a. m. Afternoon—Leave Douglas 2:15 p. m. for Ramsey. Tea at Ramsey. Address of welcome by chairman of Ramsey Town Commissioners. Short addresses by Mr. W. H. Alcock, M.H.K. and Mr. A. H. Teare, J.P. Return via Laxey.

**FRIDAY, JUNE 27th:** Convention (closing session) at Villa Marina at

10 a. m. Afternoon—Reception by His Worship the Mayor of Douglas in Villa Marina. Evening at 7:30. Final Rally and Mhealliah in Villa Marina.

**SUNDAY, JUNE 29th:** Open air service at Kirk Braddan 11 a. m. (optional). Manx Language service in St. George's Church, Douglas, at 7:55 p. m. Sermon in English by the Lord Bishop.

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Really a remarkable programme arranged by the W. M. A. and may we congratulate them for their co-operation and support also for the effort they have put into this convention to make your visit an enjoyable one. At the meetings you will be entertained by the finest speakers both on the Island and abroad. Canadian Dominion Day, July 1st, and American Independence Day, July 4th. The programme for these two days entertainment will be discussed aboard the "Doric" going over and will be officially announced when the party reaches Douglas.
