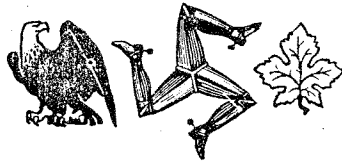

It is with deep regret we record the passing of our Past President and grand Manxman, Mr. Daniel Teare, 445 South Windsor Blvd., Los Angeles, on October 22nd.

Daniel Teare was born on the farm of Ballalerghey, in the Parish of Bride, Isle of Man. As a youth he was well known on the north of the Island for his work in connection with the Wesleyan Methodist Church and Sunday School, and in which he was always interested, as attested by his many financial gifts to the cause in Bride. He married Mrs. Kneale of Chicago who was also born in Bride, Isle of Man, daughter of the late John Quayle of the East Kimmereagh.

Mr. Teare was elected president of the N. A. M. A. in June, 1930, at Montreal and took active charge of the Home-going party. He presided at the 1930 Convention in Douglas.
