BORDER CHAMBER of COMMERCE

March 20, 1934

The Border Chamber of Commerce is particularly happy to extend a most cordial welcome to all delegates of the Seventh International Manx Convention to be held in the Border Cities in August, the 15th, 16 and 17th.

On the banks of the Detroit River, visiting Manxmen will find the oldest continuous white settlement in North America away from tidewater, established in 1701. Here is the scene of the Jesuit Richard's Christianizing efforts among the Huron Indian in 1728—here the background of Chief Pontiac's ill-fated conspiracy of 1763—here the battleground of renowned Chief Tecumseh—ground trod by Cadillac, founder of Detroit, General Sir Isaac Brock, La Salle, Frontenac and Fathers Breboul and Chaumonot.

Meeting of Detroit-Windsor Society and N. A. M. A. Executive

The officers and members of the above Society invited President J. Y. Mann to meet with them March 17th and 18th, at Windsor, Ontario, relative to the 1934 Convention which they are sponsoring this year. President Mann, being unable to be present due to long distance travel from Winnipeg to Windsor and to curtail expense incurred, appointed Past President John R. Cain, and Secretary Art B. Kelly, of Cleveland, to attend this meeting to give the officers and members of the local society the benefit of their experiences in arranging the details of the convention.

A meeting with the Convention Committee Chairmen was held at the Prince Edward Hotel, Saturday evening, and details discussed with each chairman. A general plan was outlined to lay before the general meeting on the following day. Many suggestions concerning headquarters, dates of convention, and tentative plans for entertainment were taken up, making it a very enjoyable and profitable meeting.

The following morning, Mr. Cain, Mr. R. H. Corkill and Mr. Kelly held conferences with the Hon. David A. Croll, Mayor of Windsor; Miss D. Dowsall, secretary, Chamber of Commerce; Mr. Rush and Mr. Musselman of the Prince Edward Hotel and the editor of that fine Canadian newspaper, "The Border Cities Star." All are intensely interested in our Manx Association and expressed their willingness to give their fullest cooperation to make our 1934 convention in Windsor the best ever.

The general meeting of the Detroit-Windsor Society was called for the afternoon by President J. W. Stephen, who welcomed the officers of the N.A.M.A. and thanked them for giving up their time to come to Windsor to advise them in the arrangement of the 1934 convention.

The meeting was turned over to Past President Cain who very ably presented the reasons for a convention and explained why so many of our Manx friends attend these reunions year after year. He outlined the duties of the local society in sponsoring same, and mapped out the work of each committee. He stressed the need for enthusiasm on the part of each member to make this most unique reunion sponsored by the Manx people of two

nations—America and Canada—working harmoniously together, another great success.

After discussion, it was unanimously agreed that the Prince Edward Hotel, Windsor, be Headquarters, and that the dates be August 15th, 16th and 17th, with a get-together meeting on Tuesday evening, the 14th, at the Prince Edward Hotel, this latter to be arranged by the local society.
