Come to Cleveland, for here will be seen,
The finest convention that ever has been.

"COME TO CLEVELAND"

This is the slogan adopted by the Manx of Cleveland for the great convention of 1935. We broadcast now to the Manx people of the world these words and issue them as a cordial and sincere invitation.

Cleveland has ever been a magic word to Manx people, because the Manx have been identified with its growth for over a century—and that growth from a tiny hamlet to a city of almost a million people. Coupled with this, Cleveland has been the center of all things Manx. Since the early pioneer days in this Western Reserve, Manxmen have been "Preserving our ancient heritage." These early settlers, though few in number, banded together and in 1851 founded the Mona's Relief Society, and two years later organized the Mona's Mutual Benefit Society, both of which societies have grown steadily for over 80 years, step by step, until today their memberships number in the hundreds.

We pay tribute to those fine Manxmen and Manx women whose zeal and devotion through these years made it possible for us to enjoy the fellowship of our kinsfolk.

Cleveland again proved a trail blazer in the organization of the first Junior group on the continent—the Cleveland Junior Manx Society. This plan is being successfully followed in other cities.

In 1928 Cleveland also furnished the inspiration to "preserve our heritage" on a larger scale. During the splendid first convention, held in August of that year, the North American Manx Association came into being.

As the pioneers of by-gone days created for us these local societies, so are we building a monument that we know will be treasured by future generations of Manx people all over this vast American Continent. We may not realize the full extent to which this will spread any more than those founders of Cleveland Societies realized their contribution to posterity, but we sincerely hope and believe we are pioneers.

Each year since 1928, we have met in Convention and enjoyed the fellowship of those whose interests and ours are based on the same love of "Ellan Vannin."

Cleveland is again privileged to be the host in 1935, and we are glad to be able to extend the invitation. All Ohio Manx Societies are united to the end that this reunion will be something you will remember always, as
