Christmas Message From Our President &

Manx Friends Everywhere:

It is with a great deal of pleasure, but with a little sadness, that I greet you at this holy time. As we come into this joyful season, we realize that peace does not reign over all the earth. I am thinking of the homeland with its blackouts and its fear of air raids, and I am sure that all the members and friends of the N.A.M.A. will pray with me that this war will soon be over.

It is nineteen hundred years and more since Jesus was born in Bethlehem, and the first Christmas service was held out under the Judean stars with an angel as the preacher, the heavenly host as the choir and the simple shepherds as the congregation. Not in some resplendent temple. stately palace or lordly mansion; but out under the sky of the templed hills, out in the fields where men who toiled, waited and watched for his coming, came the words of the angel, "Fear not: for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. The road to Bethlehem runs right


The homes of folks like me and you."

The Posy Corner

A big bouquet of orchids is due our new Vice-President, Mr. J. Wilson Jenkinson, Washington, D. C., for his work among the Manx during the month of September. When he left the Convention in Lincoln, he headed Westward, visiting Manx people in Colorado, Montana, Vancouver, Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles and several other points before returning to his home in Washington. He secured many new members for the North American Manx Association, to say nothing of the goodwill he scattered along the way. While in Los Angeles, he attended the September meeting of the Manx Society in that city, and their Secretary, Mr. T. Donald Bain, reports that in a well chosen speech, Mr. Jenkinson told them of the aims of the N.A.M.A. and of the good fellowship that comes with service in the Manx cause.

We quote below a few of Mr. Jenkinson's comments regarding his contacts with certain of the Manx people during his travels:

"Robert S. Killey, Treasurer of Pitkin County, Colorado, was unable to attend the Convention in Lincoln. His brother, Wm. H. Killey (Bill), and sisters, Emma and Rebecca, of Denver attended, however, and Bob no doubt now knows what he missed and is promising himself a visit to Montreal next August.

"Bill Killey enjoyed himself no end at Lincoln, and said so. He was wearing a beautiful Masonic ring given him by his sisters, and he kept posted as to the time by a watch presented to him by his lodge last year in recognition of his services as Worshipful Master in charge of the ceremonies incident to its 75th anniversary. It is hoped that attending Manx Conventions will become a habit with him. He advised that Tom Beck, a native of Laxey, had also been Master of his lodge two or three years previously. We would like to see Tom at some of our conventions.

"Bob Killey is High Priest of the Keystone Chapter of Royal Arch Masons in Aspen, Colorado. His Chapter recently was host to the

Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Colorado, led by Grand High Priest Hugh E. Clucas, a real Manxman and proud of it. Hugh Clucas is a well known Manxman of Colorado, and never fails to evince his interest in Manxmen by visiting them when he is in various places on his travels through the State. And it may be said, 'the happy the Manx are to see him, and to put the taypot on the hob in his honor and enjoy a cooish with him.' He was born at Kiomslieu, Foxdale, Isle of Man, came to the United States in 1875 and learned the machinist trade at Mt. Vernon, Ohio. He entered service with the Santa Fe in Kansas, later being transferred to Pueblo, Colorado, as Division Foreman, remaining in that capacity until his retirement after fifty years of service. He was married to Mattie Worden of Mansfield, Ohio, and three children were born to them.

"Harry Lace is a cousin of Mr. Clucas and is proud of his relationship. He reported he fully intended to be at the Lincoln Convention, but that indifferent health prevented him from being present. He promises himself a good time at Montreal next year, however.

"Manx folks are likely to be living anywhere on this Continent. Mr. John T. Clucas of St. Marks, and Mrs. Clucas (nee Edie Maddrell of Ballacallin, the Braaid) live at Greybull, Wyoming. I called on them and enjoyed talking with them about friends we knew and places in the Isle of Man we fondly remember. They have two sons and a daughter, the latter being Mrs. Leroy Atkins of Los Angeles."

Looking back to far-off Christmas times in the Isle of Man, what do we see?

In Douglas, busy nights along Strand Street the week before Christmas—feathered fowl swinging in the flare of gaslights outside the shops—rows and rows of sugar mice and lively bustle.

other surprising novelties in J. J. Kelly's and other sweet shops—Santa Claus (headquarters at Webb's)

mobbed by an army of youngsters—windows with cotton snowflakes and Christmas cards glittering with frost, holly and robin redbreasts. And up from the deserted Promenade, through dark and gusty Regent Street, Granville Street, Howard Street, the continuous boom of the surf, heard but not heeded in the

All over the Island, for a week or two before Christmas, small boys in draughty doorways singing "While Shepherds Watched"; the "callers" proclaiming in the early hours "a fine frosty morning"; choirs in the midnight streets on Christmas Eve—and on Christmas morning, the churches gloriously decked and ringing to the grand old hymn "Christians, Awake."

On St. Stephen's Day, the "Hunt the Wren" boys, keeping up a custom so old that its origin is no longer clear; jolly parties through the week, and a chance to see a fine performance of "Pinafore", "The Mikado" or other light opera by the Douglas Choral Union (long may they live), and on New Year's Eve, after the Watch Night Service and the solemn strains of "Days and Moments Quickly Flying", the excitement of welcoming the "Qualtagh", first person to enter the house in the New Year—one occasion when blondes are not preferred, but the "dark man" is the eagerly anticipated first-foot, to bring luck to the house.

It was a big event if there was enough frost to crackle in the "dubs" along the road, or enough snow to make slides and snowballs and put a white cap on old Snaefell, Greeba and Slieu Whallian. But stars were bright as diamonds in the sky swept clean by biting nor' easters which favored us all winter with their cold, invigorating breath, and within doors evenings were long and jolly around cosy firesides.

This year Christmas will be dark indeed in the Homeland. Yet, over the little Island, lying black and silent in the midst of the sounding sea, the Christmas stars will shine more brilliantly than ever, and Manx firesides will be warm and bright with faith, courage—and hope for the dawning of a New Year bringing Peace and Good Will to all mankind.
