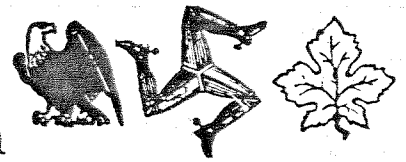

Cleveland Convention Outstanding Success ... It's Montreal In 1961! ...

Cleveland was host to the North American Manx Association for the fifth time when the 30th Convention was held there in the Sheraton-Cleveland Hotel, August 7 through 10. This year the usual routine was changed by having Registration Day and "Cleveland Night" on Sunday — official opening on Monday morning. The reason for starting at the beginning of the week was to give people a few days after the Convention to visit friends in Cleveland, or to proceed on their vacations or get home without losing a couple of days.

All day Sunday, the lobby and mezzanine of the hotel were buzzing with Manx voices, and in the evening an overflow crowd was present for "Cleveland Night." This was a fine gathering of Manx folk, and a good chance for friends to visit. Entertainment Chairman Orton Reed had arranged an excellent program, which included duets by the Misses Edith and Linorah Cox of Cleveland, solos by Joe Clucas and Orton Reed of Cleveland and Walter J. Stevenson of Chicago, recitations (including Manx poems by Mrs. M. Waterson of Peel) by Miss Doris Clague of Douglas, Isle of Man, and the showing of colored slides of Manxland taken by the General Chairman, W. Harry Kelly. Joe Clucas was accompanied on the piano by his daughter, Mrs. Charles (Mona) Rose, and a most interesting surprise at this point was a hymn, in Manx, sung as a duet by Joe and Mona. These numbers were interspersed with hearty community singing, led by Orton Reed. Official accompanist was Mrs. Ray Haldeman.

The Convention opened officially on Monday morning, when General Chairman Harry Kelly extended greetings and a warm welcome to all. The Parade of Flags which followed was very impressive. As each flag was carried in, the audience sang the National Anthem of that country — "The Star-Spangled Banner," "O Canada," and "O Land of Our Birth." Mrs. Douglas Cannell of Lakewood was accompanist. The Rev. Mr. Joseph Partridge of East Moline, Ill., made the Invocation, after which the General Chairman introduced the Mayor of Cleveland, the Hon. Anthony J. Celebrezze. The Mayor said he was proud that the first Manx Society was started in Cleveland, and that

the Manx people have been a credit to the community. He extended a cordial invitation to the visitors to come to Cleveland frequently, and have a good time.

At this point, Harold S. Cain from the Isle of Man was introduced to the Mayor and to the audience. Being a member of the House of Keys, he was very much interested in Cleveland city government, and in how the various City departments were operated. Mayor Celebrezze offered Mr. Cain a personal escort to tour the city, especially to visit the water works, sewage plants and forestry department. Mr. Cain thanked him for this courtesy.

Mr. Kelly then expressed thanks to everyone for coming, and said he was very grateful for the financial aid that made the Convention possible. Mrs. Jack Oldham (Blanche Cowley Young) was introduced, and she announced that her book "How the Manx Cat Lost Its Tail" could be bought at Higbee's Department Store. The meeting was then turned over to N.A.M.A. President Fred Caveen, who welcomed everyone and introduced the N.A.M.A. officers who were with him on the platform, after which he called on the Corresponding and Recording Secretary, Miss Mildred Corris, who read greetings from the following:

Bruce Caley, Manchester Manx Society; Fred and Gertrude Dainty, Liverpool. From the U.S. and Canada: Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Corlett, San Francisco Manx Society; H. Caley, R. Kelso and Eileen Killen, Winnipeg Manx Society; Mrs. Lillian Tipper, Los Angeles Manx Society; Mrs. Quayle, Los Angeles; Bob and Maggie Costain, East Helena, Mont.; Dr. J. J. Moore, Chicago; Mrs. Thomas Kelley, Albany, Ore.; J. Ronn DeLaney, Miami, Fla. There was also a greeting from the World Manx Association, Douglas, signed by more than 50 people who were present at one of their functions.

President Caveen then called for an-

nual reports on the year's work. Secretary's report was presented by Miss Mildred Corris, financial statement by Henry C. Christian, and report on the Bulletin by Miss Gertrude Cannell.

After a fine lunch, everyone congregated at the hotel entrance, where buses were loaded for a ride out to Clague Park (named after early Manx settlers), in Westlake, where there was a wonderful opportunity for a real old-fashioned cooish, sitting at tables in the open air. Later in the afternoon a most delicious smorgasbord was served, thoroughly enjoyed by all. About 9 P. M. the buses returned for their passengers, and needless to say, there was singing all the way back to the hotel.

On Tuesday morning the meeting opened with the singing of the National Anthems, accompanied by Mrs. Minnie Oakley of Toronto (who also officiated on Wednesday). The Rev. Alexander Cock of River Rouge, Mich. made the invocation. The Secretary, Miss Mildred Corris, read the names of those who had passed on since the last convention (a lengthy list). After this, the Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Joseph Partridge, delivered a very fine memorial sermon, "The Grave and the Garden," which was most inspiring. Walter J. Stevenson sang an appropriate solo, "In the Garden," accompanied by Mrs. Fred Gorry.

Miss Mildred Corris called on delegates of the various Manx Societies for their reports, after which Harold S. Cain gave a report on the World Manx Association. Regional Directors then came forward with their reports. All of these accounts of Manx activities were most interesting. President Caveen then appointed committees on N.A.M.A. business who were to meet and make their reports on the following day. Lunch was served in the hotel.

In the afternoon, members of the Ladies' Auxiliary to the N.A.M.A. met in the Higbee Company lounge for their annual meeting and election of officers. Tea and sandwiches were served, and the ladies enjoyed this social get-together very much. Results of the election are shown elsewhere in this Bulletin.

Tuesday evening's entertainment was

well attended, the audience seated informally at tables. John R. Cain was in the chair, and introduced the various performers. Ernest Partington of Connessville, Pa. (a son of Mrs. Wm. Morrison of Miami, Fla.), assisted by his wife and daughter, gave a very clever and entertaining magician's act, which brought forth much applause. Mrs. Cecil Kelly of Chicago, always a favorite, gave some recitations, after which the superb 40-voice Cleveland Male Choir, directed by William Albert Hughes, gave a splendid program of choral and solo numbers. One of the soloists was Orton Reed, who gave as an encore his perennial favorite "The Green-Eyed Dragon." In memory of the late Robert William Skillicorn, a former member of this choir and former Financial Secretary-Treasurer of the N. A.M.A., the choir sang the hymn "Softly and Tenderly." Following the musical program, Harold Cain showed two Manx sound films he had brought from the Isle of Man — "The Isle and the Pussycat," and "The Isle of Bays." These were very beautiful and were heartily applauded. Everyone was thoroughly pleased and happy with the evening's entertainment, which will be remembered as a highlight in Manx Convention programs.

The final session on Wednesday morning opened with the singing of the National Anthems, and Invocation by the Rev. Mr. Joseph Partridge. President Caveen called on chairmen of the committees appointed the previous day. Richard Corkill, reporting for the Time and Place Committee, said that Montreal was favored for next year's Convention, pending their decision. Rev. Joseph Partridge reported on Resolutions. Henry Christian, membership chairman, reported 686 memberships during the past year. Sidney Corkish, chairman of the By-laws committee, wished to postpone the report and make suggested changes at the next Convention. Frank Williamson, chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following slate of officers for 1960-61:

All of the above were unanimously elected.

Convention Chairman Harry Kelly then introduced his committee chairmen and asked them to come forward. Mrs. Wm. Roseman and Mrs. Charles Rose, co-chairmen on the Ways and Means Committee, did a remarkably fine job, he said. John R. Cain, Publicity Chairman, was complimented on the fine Manx writeups by Theodore Andrica, Nationalities Editor of the Cleveland Press, which appeared in the paper during several days before the Convention; the television interview arranged for Harold Cain with Dorothy Fuldeheim; also the publicity in the Cleveland papers while the Convention was in progress. Orton Reed, Entertainment Chairman, did a very fine job in providing and arranging programs, as well as taking part in them. Miss Elinor Cain worked very hard on the Souvenir Program, and with her father, John R. Cain, turned out an excellent book. Henry Christian, on Transportation, worked with the Cleveland Transit Company in handling the trip to Clague Park in a very smooth and efficient manner.

Mrs. Fred Gorry and Mrs. R. R. Gell, in charge of Refreshments, saw to it that everyone was well fed — the Convention could not get along without this committee! Mrs. Lily McKibbin and her crew of helpers did a truly wonderful job on Registration — they were at the desk throughout the Convention. Fred Gorry and his Reception Committee were on hand every day, and practically all day to greet guests, meet trains and extend a Manx welcome. Miss Mona Cowell, Convention Treasurer, has a splendid financial report to make, and her thanks and praises go to all who contributed money toward the success of the Convention.

Mr. Kelly closed the session by appealing to all to support the N.A.M.A. by obtaining new members and thus helping to keep the Association alive. After the adjournment, many beautiful gifts were distributed, going to lucky people in all parts of the Continent.

Wednesday evening brought the big event of the Convention — the Banquet in the Sheraton-Cleveland Hotel. An orchestra played during dinner, after which the outgoing President, Fred Caveen, greeted the guests and introduced the toastmaster, Harry Kelly, who proposed toasts to the Governments of the United States, Canada and the Isle of Man, and to all loyal Manx people wherever they might be. Mr. Kelly then introduced the officers and visitors seated at the speakers' table. The program opened with Walter Stevenson giving some lovely songs; he was followed by Miss Doris Clague from Douglas, whose Manx dialect recitations from the works of T. E. Brown and the late Philip Caine were beautifully done.

Principal speaker of the evening was the Hon. Harold S. Cain, Chairman of the World Manx Association and Member of the House of Keys, who gave a very interesting and detailed account of present-day activities in the Isle of Man. He thanked the President and officers of the N.A.M.A. for the fine work they are doing among the Manx people here. Orton Reed then gave some fine baritone solos, which concluded a program of unusual excellence. Mrs. Ray Haldeman was accompanist.

The floor was then cleared for the "Grand March," in which everyone joined, wearing fancy hats. Dancing followed, and it was after midnight when this wonderful 30th Convention closed, with a huge circle of Manx people in the ballroom, hand in hand, singing "Auld Lang Syne."

Harold Cain's Trip

Mr. Cain arrived in Cleveland a few days before the Convention and stayed with Mr. and Mrs. Harry Kelly of Maple Heights. Through arrangements made by John R. Cain he was interviewed on television on August 4 by Dorothy Fuldheim on her evening program. With Harry Kelly and John R. Cain he visited the offices of the Cleveland Plain Dealer and the Cleveland Press, and was interviewed and photographed for these papers. William Roseman, son-in-law of Harry Kelly, took him to see Miss Claire Mylecraine, former N.A.M.A. Secretary, then in hospital. On Sunday morning, August 7, a few Cleveland Manx took Mr. Cain to Highland Park Cemetery to lay a wreath on the grave where a number of lonely Manx people are buried. After the Convention, Mr. Cain visited Chicago, Rochester, Niagara Falls and Toronto, as reported elsewhere in the Bulletin.
