THE LONG BOATS OF PITCAIRN ISLAND

The earliest recorded history of Pitcairn Island built boats dates from 1808, eighteen years after the famous "Bounty" mutiny. Like most Manx people, the Pitcairn Islanders have a certain portion of salt water flowing in their veins and have proven excellent craftsmen in addition to their navigation abilities.

In the late 1800's Queen Victoria sent a 33' lifeboat to the Island and the Pitcairn people named the lifeboat after the famous Queen, however, in the year 1911 they decided to build their own long boat and called it "Surprise". It is interesting to note that this boat served as a model for all boats built later. Evidently the handling abilities of this type of boat were excellent, capable of surviving the treacherous Pitcairn surf, while the Islanders were capable oarsmen coupled with helmsmanship they were able to travel to Henderson Island for MIRO wood landing their boat stern in on the coral and returning to the Island thro' Bounty Bay and landing on the extremely rugged beach filled with boiling surf and huge rocks.

Because these boats are built without blueprints or plan, only the eye of the practical craftsman can place the models, so that the finished boat will be functional yet aesthetically pleasing.

Interesting the construction of the Pitcairn long boat takes place on the lower plateau of the Island some 250' above the sea, here closer to the Islander's homes and the Island wood supply the sturdy lines which characterize the Pitcairn long boats takes form under the trees. All wood materials originally used in long boat construction were pain's takingly hand-hewn and pit-sawn, but these long boats have a unique role, the boats don't have the outwardly spiritual significance of Polynesian sailing craft, but are critically essential to the spirit of the Islanders as anything in that small universe.

IT'S BICENTENNIAL TIMES FIVE FOR THE ISLE OF MAN IN 1979

By resolution of the Tynwald, the Isle of Man will celebrate the Millennnium of that representative assembly -- the oldest continuing parliament in the world -- in 1<u>979</u>.

The resolution, introduced by Mrs. Hansen on March 22nd, noted that recent historical research indicates the founding of Tynwald by King Godred I Haraldson between 975 and 980 A. D., and called for the appointment of a Select Committee of that body to plan and coordinate the 1000th Anniversary. The Select Committee will work with the IOM Tourist Board and all other interested bodies. Mr. Delaney, in seconding the resolution observed that "The Americans last year celebrated their anniversary and our Sovereign Queen this year is celebrating hers and I would like to see a thousand years of Tynwald celebrated in an (equally) befitting manner."

The Tynwald has called upon Manx Societies throughout the world to consider ways they can participate in the once-in-a-thousand-years event. the Millenium of the "Grandmother of Parliaments." Perhaps 1979 would be the year of a general exodus for all American-Manx and Canadian-Manx to be, returning to their "roots" to witness and participate in the unique occasion. 1979, perhaps, should be the first and most important "homecoming" for NAMA members who have never visited Ellan Vannin previously, and the fitting opportunity for one more visit for those who have already made that important pilgrimage.

MANX STAMPS

A set of Manx postage stamps honoring Colonel William Christian was included in the contents of the Virginia Time Capsule, sealed at Yorktown on April 15th. The stamps, issued by the Post Office Authority in 1976 to commemorate the Manx-American hero of the American war of independence, was placed with other important memorabilia of the Bicentennial celebration in the two cubic foot aluminum container, along with a letter fron Virginia's Governor. the Hon. Mills Godwin, to Virginia's governor in the year 2075. Mrs. Godwin had the honor of sealing the "time box".

Officiating at the ceremony at the Yorktown Victory Centre was the Hon. John W Warner, former administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. He was accompanied by Mrs. Warner, the former Elizabeth Taylor,

YOUR CERTIFICATE



It is recorded that the NORSE ruled MAN for about 300 years from A.D. 950 to 1266, and during this time they completely revolutionized the island, and its people. They were a verile race and that their roots struck very deep is evident, for their blood still flows in Manx veins. Most noteworthy is that they instituted their mode of Government, namely "Tynwald" which is the oldest continuous Parliament in the world today, and is admired by many nations. One must not overlook the fact that the Isle of Man itself is a nation, although one of the smallest, if not the smallest nation in the world, being small is not detrimental, because a small jewel can posses and emit beauty. The "Manx" nation is as much a national entity as any other, no matter how large and powerful, and the story of our Homeland is immensely long and old. While "Man" is one of the oldest place names in the British Isles, it's meaning has long been the subject of speculation among scholars. It is evidently of pre-Celtic origin and appears in various forms; Mona, Manann, Ellan Vannin. etc., however, "Mannaanin Veg' Veen' (translated) still means "Dear little Isle of Man".

The Norse imposed stern discipline, and impressed their inspiration in a characteristic art for which we are truly grateful, and in various parts of the Island, and in particular the Northern Parishes many Scandanavian beautiful, richly engraved, and sculptured stone slabs have been unearthed. These stones with their richly engraved Celtic crosses form a continuous series of monuments showing the Celtic influence and the

spread of development of Christian Art in the Kingdom of MAN seldom found elsewhere.

Thankfully many of these stones are now on display under cover at many of the churches throughout the Island and it is only fitting that a great deal of credit should be given to the late Phillip Kermode who devoted his life to MANX history and in preserving these monuments.

Referring to the outside border on your Certificate, this depicts the interesting chain which can be seen linking each of the corner crosses. This design or ring of chain is by "Gault" who was the first and greatest of our Norse Sculptors. It was he who originated the peculiar MANX decorative treatment of the head cross, also introduced a new pattern of the Ring Chain. The cross in each corner is known as "Thordeifs" Cross, also a great Norse sculptor, and this particular cross can be seen at Kirk Braddan church where it is admired by thousands. Similar designs are found on the other stones all with interlacing

Within the Crest and at the top is the Three Legs of Man and it was during the 12th century that Alexander III of Scotland introduced the Three Legs as the Coat of Arms, however, the Three Legs was known on MAN and the Isles long before his time. It is reported that the Crusaders brought it from the East, where it had long been known in every country from Syria to Sicily.

Confirmation of the early introduction of the Three Legs into MAN is found in its representation on the Ancient MANX Ceromonial Sword of State.

The yellow shown represents the MANX National Flower the "CUSHAG", it also denotes the yellow gorse which displays a mass of brilliant yellow colour over the countryside during the months of July - August.

In the left hand side, the great Bould Eagle representing the United States, while on the right is the proud red Maple Leaf familiar as the emblem of Canada.

The surrounding circle in purple represents the purple heather spread as a huge coloured carpet over the mountains of the Island, truly a lovely sight to behold during the months of August - September.

MANX ELECTRIC RAILWAY

Plans for the future of the Manx Electric Railway may include a three year experimental re-opening of the closed northern line to Ramsey.

This was the proposition laid before Tynwald, the committee chaired by Mr. J. C. Nivison, M.L. C., warned that if the re-opening proves to be a success, all experts are agreed that it will be necessary to spend an estimated £600,000 on the line to Ramsey in the next 12 years.

FUTURE USE OF BISHOP'S COURT.

A delegation from the many groups on the Isle of Man were to approach the Select Tynwald Committee to consider the future of Bishop's Court and to submit practical suggestions that would make full use of the building and would also preserve the residence, the Tower, Bishop Wilson's Library and the Chapel, including the grounds with the fortifications, the ice-house and the oldest recorded trees in Mann. The buildings are undoubtedly among the most important in the Island as they represent the ecclesiastical history of the Manx Church.

KNOW YOUR ANCESTORS

In the last Buletin, I mentioned a collection of articles I had on the various parishes on the Isle of Man. From your responses I will try to have a series of articles on this subject. This month we will review the PARISH OF PATRICK, and particularly FOXDALE, in response to a request from Mr. Robert C. Camaish of Vienna, Virginia.

The coastline of the Parish of Patrick, in the Sheading of Glenfaba, is very rugged and composed mainly of high, jagged cliffs and sharp narrow beaches with scarcely any sand.

Patrick is divided from Parish of German by the River Neb, with the boundaries of both parishes going through the center of St. Patrick's Isle. The parish is dedicated to St. Patrick and the area is 106344 acres. It is 6 miles long and about 34 miles broad.

It is bounded on the North by Kirk German: on the South by Kirk Christ Rushen, Kirk Arborv and Kirk Malew; on the East by Kirk Marown and Kirk Malew; and on the West by the sea.

Some of the surnames common in this parish are Quane, Cowley, Quirk and Kneen.

Patrick Parish includes Dalby, with its wonderful beaches; Knockaloe, the experimental farm of the Insular Board of Agriculture which has done much to improve the standard of farming in the Island; Glen Maye, one of the loveliest pieces of green glen scenery in the Island; Niarbyl, derived from Yn Arbyl (Celtic) meaning "the tail": and Slieu Whallin, slieu meaning mountain. Foxdale takes on its name from the Viking "Foss" meaning waterfall and "Daff" meaning valley, and from the Scandinavian "Forsdalr" meaning waterfall dale or valley of waterfall. In the old records it is also shown as "Ffoxdaile" and "Ffoxdall".

Foxdale itself is a village of little scenic value, but it has much history, for this was one of the main mining centres of the last century, and many ruins on the mountainside surrounding the village still remain. Old rough stone mine shafts and chimneys dot the landscape and mounds of "spoil" deposited by the mines still remain.

Foxdale produced some of the finest silver ore in Britian in the 1800's. These mines were the most productive in the Kingdom and were closed down in 1911 after having been worked for over a century.

The only hotel in the village was built in 1887 and is still a very comfortable Country Inn. completely modernized, where the best of food and drink is available.

It is said that the bakery in East Foxdale is one of the best on the Island because the crystal clear spring water from the mountains enhances the quality of their products.

MR. CHARLIE FELTON AND HIS MAGNIFICENT MEASURING MACHINE

There may be some in this fast moving world who believe there's no room for the old way of doing things but Charlie Felton, who runs Peel's oldest ironmongers and hardware store isn't one of them.

The paint and polishes may be sold in bright tin and plastic containers and paid for with "new money" but there's one corner of the old store which hasn't changed for nearly 100 years.

Standing regal among all the other products of the 20th century is a unique piece of measuring apparatus which towers almost seven foot tall and bears a royal coat of arms.

This ornate paraffin pump, which is believed to be almost 100 years old, was originally manufactured in Worksop, but the pump has spent its entire "working life" in Charlie's shop at 7 Michael Street.

This rare piece of apparatus comprises of a tall glass cylinder with a number of bright china discs suspended inside, each disc having a different measurement marked on it. The glass cylinder stands on an ornamental cast iron stand which is capped with a Royal Coat of Arms.

"The pump is operated by a brass topped wooden handle, similar in appearance to the pumps found on the bar of a Public House" says Charlie, "and each time a customer requires paraffin, the liquid is pumped into the cylinder to be measured, before being emptied through a funnel at the base of the pump into a container."

The copper pipes, polished wood, brass fittings and ornate ironwork blend together with the glass and china to form a beautiful machine, surely a credit to the craftsmen who carefully constructed it all those years ago.

And Charlie verifies that the pump still works perfectly today giving exact, in fact slightly generous measure of paraffin in a clean and practical way.

"I don't think a day goes by when I don't use it," he said.



In proper heraldic language the shield is described as "gules, three legs armed, conjoined in fesse at the thighs, flexed in triangle, proper booted and spurred, or." Translated, that means, three legs in armor, bent at the knee and joined at the thigh, ornamented in gold on a red background.

The "three legs" of Man first appeared sometime during the 14th century on the village cross of Kirk Maughold, then, in 1395, on the shield of Sir William le Scrope, king of Man, but no one is sure of its origin. One old saying — another bad joke — is based on the Isle of Man's location. If you imagined the shield stuck on a map over the island, you'd know why people say that "the Isle of Man kneels to England, kicks at Scotland, and spurns Ireland."
