THE NORTH AMERICAN MANX ASSOCIATION

The following is an amended version of an article written by the late Mr. and Mrs. Harry Kelly for the 1968 Convention. It seems appropriate to include it in this edition when the N.A.M.A. is celebrating its 50th Anniversary.

In August 1928 over 1,000 Manx people and their descendants gathered in Cleveland and organised the "North American Manx Association"! The idea for this was born during the first great Manx Homecoming in 1927.

At the first meeting visitors from the Isle of Man included the late A. B. Crookall and the late Richard Cain, both of whom were greatly responsible for the founding of the North American Manx Association, Manx people from all over Canada and the U.S.A., including two busloads from Toronto, Canada.

The Association was formed to unite all Manx people of this great Continent. Conventions have been held in various cities of Canada and the U.S.A., from Montreal to Vancouver and from San Francisco to Rochester and more recently in 1970 and 1976 on the Isle of Man. Space does not permit a full report of all Conventions, other than to say every Convention was very successful. There are three Conventions that should be mentioned, the Victory Convention held in Toronto, Canada in 1947, the Twenty-first Anniversary held in Cleveland in 1949 and in 1950 the Detroit-Windsor when membership reached its height - one thousand and fifty-one members.

The Association arranged three Homecoming parties, in 1930 and 1952 by boat to the Isle of Man and by plane in 1958. The outstanding achievement of the N.A.M.A. was during the war in the year 1941 when they raised \$6,172.80 for a Manx Rescue Patrol Boat for the British War Relief, a Directory was issued in 1950.

The N.A.M.A. has done many fine things, but the greatest of all is the Bulletin, for 50 years it has carried the activities of the Societies and all the news of our Manx people. It has kept us united and encouraged new Societies in Canada and the U.S.A. The N.A.M.A. has been very fortunate to have such excellent people as Editor of the Bulletin.

One could write a book about the fine Manx men and women who have served as President of the N.A.M.A. and the loyal people who have been officers and our faithful members.

Many have passed on, but their memories live in our hearts. We have a wonderful Association and in this year 1978 we celebrate our 50th Anniversary. While it is nice to look back, God put our eyes in the front of our heads to look and think forward, so that the achievements of the future may be greater than those of our glorious past. Our aim has always been —

"To Preserve whate'er is left us of Ancient Heritage".

MILLENNIUM TO FEATURE A THOUSAND IDEAS

"How big a birthday cake do you need for a thousand candles," has been the question for planners of the Millennium of Tynwald in 1979. And, from latest reports, it is evident that the Millennium Year will feature more than a thousand ideas commemorating the 1000 years that makes the Tynwald the oldest continuing parliamentary assembly in the world.

A Millennium Committee, parliamentary committees, and scores of local committees are shaping up an exciting year of celebration on the Isle of Man that no one, certainly those of Manx heritage, will want to miss. Representatives of the Millennium Committee have also journeyed afar to secure participation of "long-lost cousins" from Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Iceland, Ireland and Scotland, and "Operation Roots" has received thousands of inquiries from those of Manx descent from around the world. From the Manx Society of New Zealand, for example, has come news of an "invasion" by Manx from New Zealand during the Millennium Year, and the secretary of the group indicates that their homecoming group grows larger by the day. "There has been a tremendous amount of interest generated throughout the country in Millennium activities and all things Manx," reports Christine Cleator of Auckland.

A Celtic Week will feature a major concert by famous Chieftans, performances of the Folk Theater of Ireland, dancing, music and crafts. and the like, while Scotish Week will include Highland Games at the Nunnery. There will be music festivals, sports festivals, a major air show and -- for those who missed it in New York -- several dozen "tall ships," in a race around the island.

Every Friday, Port St. Mary will feature costume day, in which the local people will wear Manx costumes in their normal pusuits. There will be fireworks and displays, concerts and plays, the planting of thousands of trees for the future, and maybe even a balloon race. A special Millennium carpet with Celtic motif is being woven by Quayle's Carpets, Ltd., and a sixty-foot long "Millennium tapestry" is being made by a group of ladies on the island. The Manx Guild of Weavers, utilizing Manx wool and natural dyes, is spinning wool for a series of pictures which will form yet another tapestry. There will be a time capsule and an important archaeological "dig" at Rushen Abbey where several Norse kings are known to have been buried. A modern English-Manx dictionary is to be published, as well

as scores of other new pulications dealing with the Isle of Man, its history and its people.

Ed Sayle, N.A.M.A.'s liaison with the Millennium Committee, reports that everyone he spoke to during a recent visit to the IOM is enthusiastic about what organizations and communities are going to do for the Millennium. "And, the nice part about it," he reports, "is that this is not they will be ready when the first fireworks go off on New Year's Day." He notes that many of the projects will continue long after the last rocket of Millennium Year fades away. "The Millennium Year," he indicates, "will be the starting point for a new and better quality of life for the Isle of Man, in which, more-and-more, we Manx descendants will be able to point with pride." "Mae and I wouldn't want to miss this once-in-alifetime experience, even if Manx heritage wasn't involved," he tells us, "The Millennium Year will be an exciting year for anyone visiting the Isle of Man."

Those Conscious of their Manx roots will probably want to visit the island during Tynwald Week to see the 1000th open air assembly, but for those who can't make it then -- or for those who might wish to avoid the crowds -- events of interest to North American Manx will be spread throughout the year. The World Manx Association has expressed hopes of seeing the largest "homecoming" year in history, and plans to roll out the red carpet for overseas Manx and their families. The Isle of Man Tourist Board is working on plans for supplemental housing so that no one gets turned away, and the projection of doubling the normal number of tourists on the island doesn't seem an exaggeration.

N.A.M.A. members should make it a point to "spread the word," to tell the Millennium story to those they know to have Manx lineage. Millennium Year is a time for all of us to share the heritage we have in common. It is also the opportunity to swell our membership ranks with those who only now, because of the Millennium, are claiming that heritage.





The Ancestral Home of President Tyler's Wife Letitia Christian Tyler

Cedar Grove is historically significant to all Americans and especially so to descendants of Thomas Christian "the imigrant" because it was the home of three generations of Christians and it was here that Letitia Christian was born and later married to President Tyler. It is located in New Kent County and the grave of Mrs. Tyler is in the old burial ground on the property.

GOLDEN JUBILEE OF THE NORTH AMERICAN MANX ASSOCIATION

Date of issue: 10 June, 1978

In 1927 Manx people from all over the North American continent made a pilgrimage back to their Island home. This Great Homecoming was arranged by Manx Societies on both sides of the Atlantic and a party of Manx people led by Mr. A. B. Crookall, M.H.K. went out from the Isle of Man to Cleveland, Ohio, to meet the Homecomers and escort them home.

The following year in August 1928, as a result of this bringing together of so many widely scattered people, the First International Manx Convention assembled in Cleveland, Ohio. The suggestion for this had come from Mr. A. B. Crookall. Mr. John E. Christian, President of the Mona's Relief Society was chairman and Manx people from all parts of the United States, Canada and the Isle of Man attended.

During this Convention the North American Manx Association was born and its constitution was drawn up and accepted. John E. Christian was elected as its first president. Its motto is "To preserve whate'er is left to us of ancient heritage." Since then Conventions have been held regularly in various parts of the U.S.A., Canada and the Isle of Man, and it is appropriate that the Golden Jubilee Convention is due to be held at Cleveland, Ohio.

The issue of a stamp to mark this memorable anniversary commemorates the achievements of many Manx people in all parts of the North American Continent.

JAMES KEWLEY WARD MANX PIONEER IN CANADA Date of issue: 10 June, 1978

In a previous stamp issue the Isle of

Man Post Office Authority have commemorated the Cleveland Manx this issue of two stamps commemorates one of the most distinguished Manx pioneers to Canada.

James Kewley Ward was born in Peel, Isle of man on the 9 September 1819 and educated at Douglas, the capital of the Island. He emigrated to America in 1842 where he became a clerk in a lumber mill at Trov. N.Y. Afterwards he obtained a lease of this mill and ran it on his own account.

being also extensively engaged in lumber operations in Steuben Co.

Finding it difficult to obtain standing timber in that part of the country, he moved to Canada in 1855, purchasing a lumbering establishment with timbered lands, on the Maskinonge River, P.Q. After 10 years he moved to Three Rivers, purchasing a mill on the St. Maurice. In 1870 he established the Mona Saw Mills in Montreal, which worked in connection with extensive timber limits on the River Rouge and other tributaries. In addition to his lumbering business, he entered into many other commercial ventures, being a director of the Montreal Cotton Co., and President of the Coaticook Cotton Co., and of the Magog Textile Print Co. He became a member of the Montreal Board of Trade in 1887, and was for many years Chairman of the Westmount School Commissioners and in June, 1895 was presented by the Board with his portrait in oil. He was also a governor of several hospital boards. For 18 years he was a member of the town council of Cote St. Antoine and for nine years he was Mayor.

In June, 1888 he became a life member of the Legislative Council of Quebec. He remained active at his business and legislative duties until his death at Montreal on 2 October, 1910 at the age of 91. During his life in Canada he never forgot his homeland and made frequent visits to the Island; he contributed generously to many Manx charities.

In 1906 he purchased the house in which he was born at Peel. The dwelling was demolished, and on the site was erected a Public Library, equipped with 2,000 books and endowed, all at Mr. Ward's expense.

This library was presented to Peel for the free use of its inhabitants. The Ward Library is still actively used and remains a permanent monument to this great Manxman.

POPULATION EXPLOSION WARNING

A warning that the Island could be grossly over-populated by the end of the century, and that the Manx people could find themselves the minority group, comes from the Society for the Preservation of the Manx Country-

In their annual report the Society calls for a curb on the present influx of new residents and states that if they continue to come to the Isle of Man at the present rate, the population will reach 95,000 by the year 2000, which is 20,000 more than the target set under the Government's New Resident Policy.

The report, which will be presented by the Society's chairman at the A.G.M. on April 24th, says that if the target of 75,000 is to be controlled, the influx of new residents will immediately have to be limited to 700 per year. "Even this could be too many," says the Society. The population was over 60,000 in 1976, which means that over 10,000 new residents have come to live here in a period of five years.

The report warns that the 1981 census could be the moment of truth, when the numerically dwindling Manx-born residents, which number 32,000, could become a minority group. "We must retain the Manxness of Mann," urges the Society.

In the past year the Society has considered 2,409 planning applications, examined 378 plans and views to the Local submitted Government Board on 123.

They have also completed a list of buildings of historical and architectural interest on the Island which they consider should be protected and which will be considered by Tynwald.

COCK, The Rev. Alexander M., of River Rouge, Michigan, died on June 16th 1978 at Heritage Hospital, Taylor. The Rev. Cock, age 85, had lived in River Rouge since 1917, he was ordained at St. Hilda's Episcopal Church where he was assistant minister. The Rev. Cock was born in Aberdeen, Scotland and emigrated to Prince Albert Island, Canada in 1913. Before entering the ministry, he had been employed by Detroit Edison for 35 years and for the last 31/2 years he was chief clerk to the superintendent of the River Rouge plant, he was ordained into the ministry in 1958 when he was 66 years old.

He served in the Canadian Army during World War One, he was the founder of the River Rouge Masonic Lodge and served as secretary for Lodge #511 for 45 years before retiring in 1966.

He was predeceased by his wife Muriel who passed away in 1969, she was born on the Isle of Man, although not Manx born the Rev. Cock was a dedicated member of the N.A.M.A. and held the office of 3rd Vice President from 1961-63, he was appointed Chaplain to N.A.M.A. from 1963-68.

Two sons, Richard and Donald preceded him, in death, he is survived by five grandchildren, five great grandchildren, one brother and one sister and daughter-in-law Mrs. Richard Cock.

KINRADE, Mrs. Mary Ann (Annie) in her 92nd year at Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Toronto, Canada, on July 15th 1978, wife of the late Thomas Harold Kinrade. Both Mr. and Mrs. Kinrade were born on the Isle of Man and were married in Marown, after emigrating to Canada they settled in the Toronto area. The late Mrs. Kinrade's family has been traced back to 900 A.D. She was a professional dressmaker and filled the Dorcas position in the Woman's Aux. of the Anglican Church of the Good Shepherd and was a life member of the Association. During W. W. II, she received a Red Cross Award for her knitting and sewing. She was a long time member of the N.A.M.A. She is survived by two daughters, Dr. Annie Dorothy and Laura Winnifred Kinrade.

MacCaa, Robt. A., of Tuscon Arizona, passed away on June 19th 1978. The late Mr. MacCaa was a ong time member of N.A.M.A., in his younger days he took a great interest in all things Manx, his father was born in Ramsey, Isle of Man. He is survived by his daughter Mrs. Mary Alice Preger, a son, and one sister Mrs. Janet MacCaa Douglas of Alliance, Ohio.

PERRY, Doris "Dollie" Perry, aged 80, former resident of Costa Mesa, Ca., passed away July 9th 1978. The late Mrs. Perry was born on the Isle of Man, and had been a member of the Los Angeles Manx Society. She is survived by three sisters who reside on the Isle of Man, one daughter, three grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Interment Bellevue Cemetery, Ontario, Cal.

PHILLIPS, Edward Wendell, passed away in hospital, July 1st 1978, aged 66 years, survived by his wife Helen (nee Greggor); 2 sisters, 1 brother; nieces and nephews. Interment Mountain View Cemetery. The late Mr. Phillips had been a long time member of the Vancouver Manx Society.

QUILLIAM, Laurence, of Vancouver, aged 80 years, passed away on June 22, 1978. Survived by his brothers, Charles of Edmonton, John, Fred and Arthur, all of the Isle of Man; nephews and niece. The late Mr. Quilliam had been a long time member of the Vancouver Manx Society.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

You have read in these pages something of the Laxey community in southwestern Wisconsin (strictly farms, no village), named for the Manx town of that name on the Isle of Man. The settlement surrounded the only Manx church known in the United States, and dates back to about 1850. The annual Laxey picnic was a memorable affair for decades. Most of the Manx (and Cornish) people and their descendants have passed on or moved away, but a few remain. And this year they decided to have a reunion, on July 2.

Robert Callin, whose father came from the I.O.M., assisted by Dan Jewell and sons, the Alva Spargos, and others, invited all former residents and families to come for an out-door service and old-style picnic... and we came! Some 140 persons were registered, from many states -- as far as Florida and California. Coming farthest was our distinguished guest (and my distant relative-by-marriage) Lilly Kelly of Peel, I.O.M.

The weather had been rainy and threatening, casting uncertainty upon the plans, but the faithful remembered the old saying: "It never rains on a Laxey picnic" -- and it didn't! As a former resident (I grew up at Laxey) and the chaplain of the N.A.M.A., I was honored at being asked to conduct the services in the beautiful restored Laxey church-yard. The church has long since been razed, but a stone marker stands, through courtesy of the Wisconsin Historical Society. Assisting in worship was the Rev. Alfred W. Swan, not Manx but knowing many in the community and my pastor of student days in Madison more than 40 years ago. The sermon theme - "Foundations" -- was suggested by texts, I Corinthians 3:11 and Hebrews 11:10. Old-time songs were sung, played on an old organ, and some wore old-time costumes of the '90's.

After the service a huge pot-luck dinner was spread on long wagons, and hearty appetites did it justice.

A program in the afternoon included readings from old-timers' records and diaries, and songs and readings by the younger generation.

An attractive souvenir booklet has been prepared by Jim Jewell, a present-day resident, giving some of the history of Laxey, information as to early preachers, a roster of the graves, etc.

For all who attended it was a memorable day, and one we would like to repeat within a few years. Significantly, it was held during the Golden Jubilee year of the N.A.M.A.
