


41st NAMA Convention Aug 19 to 22, 1994

Mr Callow will speak at the President's Reception on Friday evening.

He went to college in England to train as a teacher and also served in the RAF. When he returned to the Isle of Man to teach, he also took up an interest in Manx History, especially of Michael, Peel and Patrick. He was president of the IOM Natural History and Antiquarian Society from 1988 to 1989. Both of the Cashins are active in their community. On Sunday afternoon Tom will give a talk, Manx Miscellany, a mixture of facts and myths plus some old photos of how the Manx used to live and some

nice views of the Island.

Stephen Harrison, Director of Manx Museum and National Trust, will give a talk and slide presentation on Saturday afternoon. His talk will include some of the prestigious awards recently won by the Manx National Heritage and the exciting new projects about to commence, and how in many ways the Manx National Heritage is leading the way for heritage interpretation within Europe. Mr Harrison will be traveling with his wife, and plans to arrive in Minnesota a few days early.

Manx National Heritage includes the Manx Museum in Douglas, Cregneash Village Folk Museum, the Nautical Museum, the Grove Rural Life Museum, Castle Rushen, Peel Castle, Laxey Wheel,


Also, children under 18 stay free in rooms with their parents.



Four of the young men in the wedding party are members of the Ramsey Life Boat crew and wore their uniforms for the occasion. A highlight of their trip came the day after the wedding. They were invited to return to the Star of India and climb the rigging during a training session.





Chaplain's Corner

We Manxmen are descendants of a people of deep, simple, and profound faith as exemplified by the Manxmen who emigrated to America mid-nineteenth century and settled in the mining and farming area of Wisconsin near Dodgeville and Mineral Point. They called themselves the Laxey Community after their homeland point of origin, Laxey on the Isle of Man. Those of Primitive Methodist background in 1855 built and maintained the Laxey Church and conducted worship services and

Sunday School there. Names of the founders include Cowley, Kewley, Callow, Kelly, Faragher, Hudgeon, Quirk, Skillicorn, Gelling, Radcliffe and many other Manxmen (and also some Cornishmen). Their dedication and commitment continued through the generations. One of them, Thomas Kelly, who emigrated to America in 1853, helped build the Church and preached as a "lay preacher" there on occasion. His grandchildren carry on his contribution to our American faith and life, including namely, Rev Herbert G Kelly, retired Chaplain of NAMA, Dr Howard Kelly of Eureka, CA, Mrs Florence Kelly Schlachter (deceased), and Mrs Alice Zettel and Marion Kelly, vital members of our San Diego Society, who attended Sunday School in the Laxey Church.

The history of the Laxey Church and its people (to be featured at the Minneapolis Convention) should be an inspiration to all of us as they lived out their commitment to the Christian faith and way of life. The Apostle Peter's confession of faith: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God!" (MT 16:16) led Iesus to proclaim, "You are Peter (petros, rock) and on this rock I will build my Church." Coincidentally, the Laxey Church was built of stone. The faith of those Manx people continues as the foundation of their lives today even as it can also be the foundation of the lives of all of us loyal Manxmen.

Florence Kelly Schlachter died March 13, 1994, in Roseville, California, at the age of 76. She was born near Mineral Point, Wisconsin, location of the Laxey Church, on December 31, 1917. She has lived in Roseville the past three years. In recent years she had also lived in Granada Hills, California and Lake Almanor, California. Mrs Schlachter was employed for many years as a registered nurse, and was a member of the University of Wisconsin Alumni Association.

She is survived by her husband, John Schlachter; two sons, James Ford and Richard Ford; a daughter, Judith England; two brothers, the Rev Herbert Kelly and Dr Howard Kelly; two sisters, Alice Zettal and Marion Kelly; and three grandchildren, Rebecca Ford, Richard Ford, Jr, and Catherine Ford.

William A Roseman, 71, passed away April 15, 1994. He was the husband of Florence Kelly Roseman, and the son-in-law of Harry and Mary Kelly (Harry served several terms as President of the NAMA). Bill was diagnosed in early 1993 as having amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). Bill had served as third vice-president of the NAMA, and served two terms as trustee. He also served the Cleveland Manx Society as vice-president, and was a trustee at the time of his death.

Bill was a member of Maple Heights Masonic Lodge #736, F & AM, and served for 20 years as treasurer of Maple Heights United Methodist Church. He served in the Army during World War II, and was part of the D-Day invasion. He and Florence attended the 40th reunion, and he had hoped to be able to attend the 50th. Bill was Scotch on his mother's side, and was very proud of his Scotch heritage.

Besides Florence, his wife of 45 years, he is survived by a daughter, Mary Hitch; two grandchildren; and two brothers.

Georgina Killip passed away in April, 1994. She was born in Lonan, Isle of Man, the beloved niece of John Killip. She lived in Cleveland, where she was a care-giver. She served as Matron of the Welsh Home, a retirement facility, for several years. She also helped care for several members of the Cleveland Manx Society. She was 82. Although not able to be active in recent years, she was a member of both Cleveland Manx Society and the NAMA.

Ethel Kissack Harris passed away on April 15, 1994. She was a member of Plymouth Church of Shaker Heights, where she assisted with the sale of hand-dipped chocolates. She was also a member of the Women's Association. She was a member of the Phi Mu Sorority and the College Club of Cleveland. While not an active member in recent years, she was a member of the Cleveland Manx Society and the NAMA.

She is survived by her sister, Marion Kissack Hockaday; a nephew; great-nieces and a great-nephew; step-children, and step grandchildren.

Agnes E Quayle, the mother of NAMA President Ron Quayle, was born on August 8, 1906, near Forest City, Iowa, and died there on May 6, 1994. She met her future husband, Jim Quayle, while working at an automobile dealership owned by her future brother-in-law. Jim's father, Thomas A Quayle, was born on the Isle of Man and lived in Ishpeming, Michigan, where he was an iron ore miner. Following their marriage in 1927, she and her husband moved to Forest City where they farmed for 35 years.

Agnes was active in the Methodist Church and many different community affairs. Also, she was an avid bridge player. She developed a strong interest in her husband's Manx heritage as well as in her own heritage from her Norwegian mother and Swedish father. As Ron became involved with his Washington Manx Society and North American Manx Association activities and travels to the Isle of Man, she was particularly interested in books, photos, souvenirs and stories that Ron and his wife Margaret brought back to her.

Agnes is survived by her sons, Robert of Forest City, Iowa, and Ronald of Alexandria, Virginia; a brother, William, of Forest City, Iowa; six grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

George Alfred Frederick passed away at San Diego, May 10th, 1994, during the Solar eclipse, after fighting cancer for seven months like a champion. He was born April 17, 1909, in Lansing, Michigan, and is survived by his wife Marjorie Hall Frederick; a step-son Alfred H McLeod; a step-daughter Lauradel R McLeod; and his sisters Edna Emmett of Lansing, Michigan and Elsie Frederick of Mason, Michigan.







IOM Coin Honors Year of the Dog

Year of the Dog coins for 1994 continue to be introduced as the Isle of Man recently announced the release of its second Chinese lunar new year coin in as many years.

The reverse of the coins depicts a Pekingese dog passant gardant left (heraldic terms for standing left with face toward viewer) with YEAR OF THE DOG and the denomination about the rim, the triquetra or three-legged shield of the Isle of Man overhead with Chinese ideogram for "year of the dog" above.

The obverse depicts the crowned bust of Queen Elizabeth II facing right with legend ELIZABETH II ISLE OF MAN 1994 about the rim.

The coins are issued in 1-crown, half crown, a fifth crown, a tenth crown, and a twenty-fifth crown denominations. All coins are struck by the privately owned Pobjoy Mint in Great Britain for the Isle of Man. The Isle of Man is stressing the Island's growing business links with Hong Kong and other Far East financial centers.

Isle of Man commemorative coins were issued in 1993 to mark the Year of the Cockerel.

6 Cylinders and 6 Kingdoms

Manannán mac Lir, Son of the Sea, was living up to his age-old reputation.

According to Celtic mythology, he's the god who protects this magical little Island from marauders by making it invisible. Sure enough, lights were probing the cloud base as the seal-sleek Bristol 403 sped up the northern flank of Snaefell, past Guthrie's Memorial and over Bungalow Bridge to Hailwood's Rise, climbing from sea level to almost 1400 feet in seven spellbinding miles.

These names ring like battle cries in the ears of motorcycle racers all over the world. Together with many others, from Bray Hill to Glen Helen to Ballaugh Bridge to Kate's Cottage to Creg-ny-Baa to Signpost Corner, they punctuate the awesome and unforgiving Mountain Course on which twenty-four-karat heroes have contested the Tourist Trophy races since 1911. We're talking about just less than thirty-eight miles of narrow public roads—country lanes by US standards—hemmed in by nearly every hazard from hawthorn hedges to buildings of uncompromising solidity.

The Mountain Circuit is to modern tracks what bare-knuckle boxing is to flower arranging. The magnitude of its challenge is epitomized by the somber fact that the races have claimed 160 lives.

The fastest lap in 1911 was a fraction over 50 mph. Today's record, set in 1992 by Carl Fogarty on a Yamaha 750, is a breathtaking 123.61 mph.

Motorsport events of one sort or another—the Tourist Trophy races, the hell-for-leather Manx Rally, the Manx

Classic for pre-1965 racing and sports cars, the Manx Kart Grand Prix-stiple the Isle of Man's calendar. Manannán's misty isle is synonymous with speed.

But a desire to absorb all this lore wasn't the only reason for my visit. I wanted to spend a little time with Geoff Duke. I also reckoned that exploring "The Island," as it's known to the bike-racing fraternity, would be suitable task for the immaculate Bristol 403 whose owner, Geoffrey Burgon, is one of Britain's leading composers. His credits include the music for such acclaimed British television series as Brideshead Revisited and Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy.

Opinions voiced by Light Car magazine in 1953 were being echoed long before we reached the Steam Packet Company's ferry: "For most of us who have enjoyed our sporting motoring in a somewhat stark two-seater, there comes a time when the demands of a family call for a vehicle with more room, comfort, and civilized amenities. The few cars which offer all this plus high speed and sports car handling, and are really fun to drive, are pearls of great price. Such a one is the

Bristol type 403."

We reached Douglas, the Manx capital. Among the notables to have sailed away from the Island are Capt Myles Standish, the Pilgrim Fathers' military leader, and Capt William Sayle, who became the first governor of the Carolina Colony. William Christian, the son of a Manxman, commanded the first Virginia Regiment during the Revolutionary War after serving with George Washington and Thomas Jefferson. Christian County, Kentucky, bears his name.

The prospect of making a new life in the New World must have been immensely enticing to lure settlers from this enchanting island, with its heather-clad hills sweeping down to wooded glens, clusters of color-washed cottages, and clifflined bays.

Today's attractions for transport buffs include two motor museums, one devoted to bikes, the other to cars; a steam railway that has been chuffing since 1873; horsepowered trams in Douglas; and the Manx Electric Railway, which carried its first passengers in 1893.

As we started a lap of the Mountain Circuit, I reminded myself that very few production cars could top 100 mph in 1953. Four-seater, leather-and-walnut sedans capable of reaching that speed with only a two-liter engine under the lid were few and far between. Bristol's wind-cheating 403 was one of them.

One of the great things about such a

striking car is that it adds class to even a posh hotel's parking lot. Other guests made appropriate noises when swanked up the Grand Island in Ramsey.

Castletown, the Island's capital until 1869, is the most attractive of Man's little towns and villages. The snug harbor is watched over by the well-preserved medieval castle where Magnus, the last Scandinavian king of Man, died in 1265. Second place goes to Peel, on the west coast. This small fishing port and holiday resort is famous for kippers (smoked herrings) and for the extensive ruins of a castle and cathedral. This was the cradle of Manx Christianity.

A visit to Manannán mac Lir's realm is not complete without a walk or ride to the top of Snaefell, the smooth-sided mountain whose peak, 2034 feet above sea level, is the highest point on the Island. Mist prevented us from seeing much more than a few dozen paces as wipers swept the Bristol's windshield. But, according to a local saying, no fewer than six ancient kingdoms are visible from the summit on a clear day. I challenged Goddard to name them. He gave up after England, Ireland, Wales, Scotland, and Man.

The sixth, I told him, is the Kingdom of Heaven.


The Cleveland Medal was last successfully defended three decades ago by the only singer to win it four times, Allan Wilcocks.
