

Manxman competes in the Tour de France and the Olympics



Manx-born Mark Cavendish is one of the most accomplished athletes to come out of the Isle of Man.

The 22-year old cyclist has already made his mark on the world of competitive cycling with his wins in two stages of the Giro d'Italia, becoming known for his fast performance in the sprint stages.

The intense and straight-talking young rider came close to winning a stage on the Tour de France in his debut in the event last year. Unfortunately, he was put out of competition when a spectator stepped into his path. Brimming with confidence, he has no doubts about his ability to win in the future. As he puts it:

"The hardest thing was getting the opportunity. When you're a young pro from an undeveloped country in road cycling then you're on the back foot. But I was given the opportunity and took it with both hands."

Cavendish is unusual in being an accomplished cyclist on both road and track, and he's not short of ambition. As he told the British newspaper, The Guardian: "I'll be the best sprinter on the Tour and me and (cycling partner) Brad will be the best Madison team in the Olympics. So why shouldn't we win? I know how hard I work and how hard Brad and my team work."

NAMA President's Message



Summer is almost upon us and the convention in Bloomington, MN is excitingly near.

I know the bookings are going well and it truly promises to be a fantastic event.

The weather on the Isle of Man has been exceptional recently and for Islanders we are all hoping it will remain for the TT festival. With nearly 45,000 visitors expected and a good percentage camping fine weather will make it so much more enjoyable. It's truly amazing how the Island transforms for these two weeks. The tranquil little Island as we know it becomes a mecca for bikers of all sizes, ages and nationalities. The spirit and atmosphere around the Island is electric and there is a real buzz for everyone to enjoy. Of course, not everyone likes the TT races so many locals escape the Island for their own holidays. It can be a holiday paying for itself as locals can easily rent out their house for the festival for handsome sum.

Tynwald day (5th July with the national holiday/ ancient event being on 7th July) will be the next big event after TT on the Island with special guest this year being the Princess Royal. Please contact me directly if any member is visiting this year and we will arrange grandstand seats for you on the day.

Another big event during Manx National Week (5-12th July) will be the presentation of the North American Manx Awards for the local school children. These awards have been presented to Manx school children since 1979 with the categories evolving over time and now representing 5 different areas of interest. Manx Music, Manx Arts & Crafts, Manx Language, Outstanding Contribution to Manx Culture and 2 others spilt between Outstanding Contribution to Manx Community and Overcoming a Disability.

Each award is a specially minted silver crown for the 1st 4 categories and the remaining two get a brand new £50 Manx pound note.

Our thanks goes to the Department of Education who administer the event and are well supported by the Island's top government ministers and officials. Special mention and gratitude should go to Mrs Betty Hanson (former MHK) who helps pick the winner in each category and gives a detailed bio on each student before their award is made. She has been doing this valuable duty on our behalf since the awards began. Mr President of Tynwald, Noel Cringle, always delivers an excellent vote of thanks and highlights the importance of the Island's link with NAMA while additionally pointing out how the Manx public should be grateful to NAMA for having the foresight to invest in the Manx youth nearly 30 years ago.

NAMA's own award for "American Manx Youth" that is given each convention and kindly donated by Isle of Man Department of Education is equally important. It is still in its infancy but its recognition for North American youth who have displayed a strong interest in their Manx heritage is extremely valuable and should be rewarded. Mary Kelly will appreciate your interest in putting forward recommendations for this award in the future.

It has been some time since I mentioned the "Manx Million" and have little to report on its progress with IOM Government. To remind you, it's a project I suggested that the IOM Government help us (NAMA) in building our membership. We are acutely aware that our membership is dwindling and has been so for quite some time. However, we also know that there are over a million Manx descendents living in North America. Finding a way to make contact with these folk to inform them of their Manx heritage will reap benefits to NAMA, in the form of new members, and the IOM Government with potential visitors and investors to the Island.

Even if the IOM government agrees to fund the project over a long-term (5 plus years) it's important to note we are only volunteers in a non-profit organization and have limited resources. Therefore the funding must include the direct employment of a professional mail-house company to manage the project on our behalf. My next step is to suggest a joint feasibility committee be formed with IOM government to investigate and form a detailed report for both parties to consider. I welcome any suggestions and comments you have on the matter.

In closing I look forward to seeing you all again in August.

Unfortunately, this is the first time since 2000 that we have not received a single letter of nomination for this prestigious beautifully-carved black *Pooill Vaaish Manx* marble prize.

The Spring 2008 NAMA Bulletin carried a full-page story that was intended to remind people to submit nominations for worthy youth by May 30th, but none were received. Last fall, letters were sent to all registered local societies to encourage entries. Since that time, the topic has been discussed at state meetings. Fly over the Isle of Man...by Internet!

Many members have access to the internet, and I thought it might be fun to report on a way you can fly over the Isle of Man without ever having to leave your house.

Like many people, I use Google's Maps page to get directions and maps of places I need to go. One day, just for fun, I put in "Peel, Isle of Man" in the search box. I wasn't really expecting to get a map of Peel, thinking that my little home town probably wasn't going to be somewhere that Google would bother with. To my surprise, I was not only able to get maps of Peel, but satellite photographs too!

What an interesting perspective on things you get when you view them from above. All my childhood haunts were laid out in a way I couldn't have imagined them back when I was a little boy sliding down the grassy slopes of the headlands on a piece of cardboard.

As you can see from the image of Peel harbour and beach below, the pictures are quite sharp and show a great deal of detail.

At the top left of the picture you can see Peel Castle and the breakwater extending out to the right. Peel Hill is at the lower left, and the town of Peel sits on the bay to the right.

The resolution gets even sharper than the pictures shown, to the point where I could zoom in on my Dad's driveway and see his car parked there.




The Isle of Man on a sunny day. Note the few clouds floating over Douglas at the centre right of the image.

The satellite photographs are of fairly recent origin, and it's interesting to do a bit of detective work and try to figure out what time of year they were taken. In the image of Tynwald Hill at the bottom of this column you can see the grandstand (the white rectangular object) where the various guests sit on Tynwald Day. Since this grandstand is only erected for Tynwald Day, it's a far assumption that the picture was taken either late June or early July.

The entire Island is available online, and it's a lot of fun to pick features such as the Lady Isabella in Laxey, and the Tower of Refuge in Douglas and see what they look like from above.

It's hard to do justice to the extraordinary quality of the pictures in black and white, but it's a very exciting way to visit the Island from your desktop.

Convention Memories

Kelly McCarthy forwarded the letter below from Avril E. Quiggin Shipman, in which she reminisces about NAMA Conventions past. As the 2008 Convention approaches, we thought it would be an appropriate occasion to share Avril's memories.

The NAMA Convention in 1972(?) was organized by Ed Sayle in Arlington, VA. To my surprise I got a phone call from my Manx friend Phyllis Costain Crozier living in Canada. We were at Douglas High School for Girls and in the Girl Guides (Scouts) together. Of course, we got together, she was with her husband, son and daughter. They were attending the NAMA convention. I knew nothing of NAMA until then and Phyllis persuaded us to attend, so me and my son (age 5 years) did and I met two ladies from the IOM who knew my older sisters, Ruth and Jean. I think I joined NAMA that time and it was during the following years that Ed Sayle, Mr. & Mrs. Camaish and Mary Hayslett neé Karran started our local Manx group in Washington D.C. Area and I've been with them ever since.

In 1986 Bill Bridson arranged for the 1986 Convention in Williamsburg, VA. Dirk Ramsey Spencer* planned the entertainment for the Convention. We contacted groups who could perform Manx songs and dances and music for us. When we heard that Charles Guard was planning to attend we found a lady who loaned her Celtic Harp for Charles to play. Dirk came across the Longship Company, a Viking re-enactment group, so we arranged a "surprise" breakfast and the Vikings "raped and pillaged" us! We built a Fairy Bridge to walk over so everyone going to dinner could greet the "Little People". Julie Christian dressed up as a Manx Fairy and greeted people (Jack and Margie's daughter). My sister Jean came over from England and helped me decorate the Bridge with greens and fuchsia.

I contacted Audrey neé Gore (can't recall her married name), who was Mayor of Douglas at that time. (Audrey and I graduated from Douglas Preparatory School, known as "Stannies and Chappies" after Miss Stansfield and Miss Chapel). [Charles Guard also went there but many years after us] Audrey spoke in Manx for us. Sir Charles Kerruish was our main speaker. Gary Lightowler (an old boy** of King William's College) wrote and delivered "The Manx Fairy Times"; slipped under people's doors after they had gone to sleep. I believe we had in attendance at least 300 people and we all had a good time.

In 1992, Ron Quayle organized a NAMA Convention in Douglas, IOM. I remember a lovely concert at the Gaiety Theatre and a fun coach trip. My eldest sister Ruth and her husband Morewood Johnson attended the concert (they lived in Onchan).

In 1998 Don Quayle organized an interesting NAMA Convention in Arlington, VA. He organized a panel who discussed the future of the IOM. I belive Tim Cullen who was with the World Bank in Washington D.C. headed up the panel. He is also an old boy of King William's College.

These are the only Conventions I have attended because I was visiting the Land of my Birth and members of my family every year and I couldn't afford the other conventions.

Good Luck to NAMA's next Convention 2008.

Sails Are Set For Minnesota NAMA Convention!

Three, Two, One...Bang! The North American Manx Association Convention is off to a spectacular start on August 1-3 in Bloomington, Minnesota. We have lots of Manx kids signed up for a jam packed weekend of swimming, games, art projects, Manx music, dancing, storytelling and the history of sword fighting!

The Convention commences with a presentation by Rebecca Billman on the History of Tynwald from a Manx Youth's Perspective. Becky is the grand daughter of Rev. Devore Craine Smith and his wife, Ruth of San Diego. A 1920-30's vintage glass slide show of scenes from the Isle of Man follows. These beautiful hand-painted slides were once used by the Walter Stevenson Family to educate Chicago residents of Manx heritage and the Isle of Man.

Next, NAMA Convention attendees will board a bus for the President's Reception at the James Ford Bell Library, University of Minnesota. We will view an historical exhibit celebrating the immigration of the Manx to Minnesota that coincides with Minnesota's 150th year of statehood. Contacts have been made with the University of Minnesota's Immigration Research Center and our Minnesota Manx members to document our oral and written histories of Manx immigration. The exhibit will focus on the history of the Isle of Man, its Tynwald, the political and legal processes, finance, nature, tourism, education, and entertainment. A rich and interesting display of Manx memorabilia including IOM maps, paintings, photos, hangings, jewelry, and books will be on view.

Upon return to the Sheraton Hotel, the Convention goers will be dazzled with authentic Welsh and Manx dancing presented by *Traed y Ddraig*. This Minnesota Welsh dance group includes Minnesota Manx members, Audrey and Mike McClellan with special appearances by John and Jenny Dowling of *Perree Bane*, the renowned Manx folk dance group from the Isle of Man.

When we awake on Saturday, the Manx Sale table and raffle will be in full swing with souvenirs from the Isle of Man as well as a game of Manx Bingo. Our genealogists, Lucy Peterson and Marilyn Anderson, and James Hibbard, Archivist of the Manx Museum at University of Wisconsin-Platteville will assist us in finding and

preserving our Manx heritage. As our luncheon is served, John Dowling will delight us with a scenic presentation of sailing on the Isle of Man. To follow, Mike McClellan will give a lively demonstration for all ages about becoming a swordfighter in the Middle Ages.

Our Saturday Banquet will be "Grand" and includes a humorous opening by Fran Shimmin on Manx Names, a special address from Edmund "Eddie" Lowey of the Legislative Council from the Isle of Man, an exuberant live auction hosted by Past President Larry "Duke" Fargher, a Manx/British singing performance by Good Show Productions, and the presentation and passing of the swords to the new NAMA Officers.

Reverend Devore Craine Smith will conduct the NAMA Memorial Service honoring our NAMA and Minnesota Manx prior to Sunday morning hot buffet brunch. Also, Andrew Ravenscroft of the Wisconsin Manx will excite our imaginations by telling Manx stories and fairy tales.

Our convention will conclude with a history of the TT Races, a display of English Motorcycles in the convention hotel parking lot, and an informal dinner at the Mall of America in the evening.

Naturally, we will hold our General Meetings to hear society reports, elect and install new officers, encourage participation of our youth, preserve our heritage, plan for the 2010 convention, and discuss a possible homecoming to the Isle of Man.

After many years of planning, the Manx Society of Minnesota is ready! We are on the final leg of the race and look forward to crossing the finish line together first...the first of August, that is, of 2008!



Laa Boaldyn - the Battle between the Queen of Summer and the Queen of Winter

Laa Boaldyn has its origins in the Celtic calendar, although the battle itself is actually a Norse custom, which was absorbed into the traditional May Day celebrations of the Manx people. This event is a fascinating example of the merging of Celtic and Norse customs on the Isle of Man.

The mock battle between the two Queens represents the banishing of winter and the arrival of summer. Traditionally, on May Day, a Queen of Summer was chosen from one of the villages on the Island. Both the Queen of Summer and the Queen of Winter would have attendants, along with a Captain and his troops, to protect her. Both sides marched to a patch of common ground and staged a mock battle during which the Queen of Summer was captured and ransomed. Once the ransom had been paid, the Queen of Winter retired from battle, leaving the Queen of Summer to win.




